Cable break stops phones
Long distance telephone service to and from Carlisle and several other area cities was interrupted for about two hours Monday when a toll cable was broken between Winchester and Paris.

Carlisle-Paris branch manager Mike Seibert said Tuesday the break occurred three miles south of Paris on the Claiborne Farm. "Evidently there was some digging on the farm resulting in the cable break," Seibert said.

Cities affected by the service disruption were Cynthiana, Mayfield, North Middletown, Millersburg, Paris and Carlisle.

Seibert said the incident pointed out the importance of checking with utilities before any sort of excavation is made.

South Central Bell's program along this line is called BUD (Before You Dig) and a toll-free telephone number is provided for persons wishing to check with the utility before digging. That number is 1-800-752-6007. Seibert explained the number connects the caller with a clearinghouse in Louisville that dispatches utility company representatives to the site in question.

The outage brought a response from Russell Bell, director of Carlisle-Nicholas County Disaster and Emergency Services.

Bell and Carlisle Chief of Police Allen Earlywine labored over the inter-city radio Monday afternoon trying to learn the extent of the outage and attempting to set up temporary communications.

Bell wrote Bell: "I know that it is difficult to notify all customers when you are experiencing trouble. However, an outage of long distance service of the magnitude experienced this date leaves our community vulnerable."

"Would appreciate in the future, some notification when you are experiencing long distance service outage of any great length so I can notify those parties concerned with emergency services. We can be contacted through the police inter-city dial-up network via Dry Ridge or Paris."

Fisher receives freedom award

The Kentucky Press Association doesn't give the Freedom of Information Award often and when it does it's usually for a good cause. This year the award was given to Mercury publisher Warren Fisher, a second-generation journalist heading a newspaper that is now in its 113th year of publication.

In announcing the award, KPA President Paul Mick of the Crittenden Press in Martin said, "Warren Fisher has been one of the state's strongest leaders in seeing that local news is published, even in the face of strong opposition."

Mick went on to say that Fisher and Mrs. Elizabeth Spalding, publisher of the Kentucky Standard in Bardolow who received the Most Valuable Member Award, "are outstanding examples of the service rendered by community journalists in Kentucky."

The Freedom of Information Award wasn't the only one Fisher picked up in Owensboro, site of the KPA's winter meeting. His column "Mercury Vapors" won an honorable mention in its category.

Other winners from the Mercury in the annual writers' contest of the KPA were Jimmy Smith, who won third place for a sports feature on a Carlisle Mucksters football team from the past and Jeff Kerr, who received an honorable mention in the sports column category.

Fisher received a silver tray representing the Freedom of Information Award and also a plaque commemorating his 25 years of service to the KPA's board of directors. His seat on the KPA board will be taken by Mrs. Betty Herriman of The Winchester Sun.

On their way home from Owensboro Mr. and Mrs. Fisher visited with Mrs. Evelyn Boone in Elkton, publisher of The Two County Standard. Besides being close personal friends are the Fishers Mrs. Boone also carries Mrs. Fisher's syndicated column "Kay's Kitchen" in her paper.
