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**Nicholas County Hospital**  
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Bob Hester, administrator said only the hospital was affected by the outage. He said that the nursing home had emergency lights and power.

Hester said several circuits were kicked off when the generator started. He said it was theorized that a surge of power from the generator kicked the circuit breakers off of several circuits. Power was restored within minutes, he said.

The hospital became a refuge for several residents of Weston's Trailer Park across the road.

Hester said he sent to the hospital after the tornado warnings were broadcast to activate the emergency plan, which consisted of sheltering the patients in the halls of the hospital and opening windows and securing items that might fly around during a storm or tornado.

About 20 patients were involved as well as several visitors who stayed after visiting hours to help with the emergency plan.

"We really appreciated that," Hester said, "it helped a lot to have them here."

"And I'm glad the folks from the trailer court came over," he said. "It's good to know that people recognize we're here and feel that they can come here in times like these."

The transmitter for the system is located in the top of the courthouse and does not have emergency power. To add to that, the inter-city system, which connects Carlisle with the Dry Ridge state police post and surrounding cities, had been knocked out by lightning several days ago.

On top of all that Carlisle was more crowded than usual, with the many people in town for the Blackberry Festival.

"We had a time there with traffic control on a while," Bell said. "And it didn't get better when the street lights went out. But about all that really happened was that a fence-bender in front of the cemetery didn't get written up, but we taken care of that."

Bell said the Emergency Operations Center at the City Building about 9:30 p.m. Wednesday and the center was activated by 9:45 p.m. with the arrival of Mayor Bill Power and members of the city and county fire department.

After power was lost, Bell said, the local center had some communication with hand-held walkie talkies and they could monitor the inter-city traffic but there was no way to transmit.

"Hopefully, with the installation of this new system we can correct that," he said. "The city and county have just approved the installation of a new communications system for county official and emergency traffic. The system will be partially funded by the state (DES)."

Nicholas County Fire and Rescue Squad had a busy night with one, what appeared to be false, alarm and a

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two-alarm barn fire.
