not form the schools and county to have to borrow money to operate on until the question can be settled.

The problem, Lary says, "We are the victims of the computer age. The PVA gives the assessments to the county clerk. He sends them to the computer center where the bills are made and then shipped to the sheriff."

This is the problem that Lary and Alphin must resolve.

Lary suggested that homeowners should be allowed to pay their taxes the same amount as they paid the year before. After reassessment and readjustments, a supplemental tax bill could be sent or a refund made, whichever way the assessments went.

Property Evaluation Administrators across the state have been meeting trying to reach a decision as to what action they will take on the challenges of their assessments by the state.

The PVAs have been discussing a collective action.

Alphin said last week he had heard that the Property Valuation Association had been soliciting funds to file a suit on behalf of all affected PVAs.

Alphin also said he wanted to advise the PVAs that it is illegal to use state funds to finance a lawsuit against the state. He said the money would have to come from the

individual PVA or other individuals.

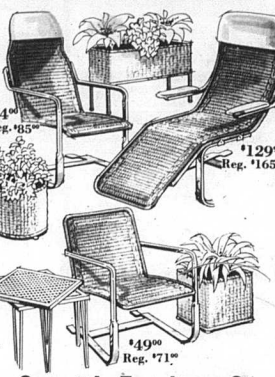
