Since Kentucky is planning its first state-wide St. Patrick's Day celebration this year, I thought you might like to get into the celebratory mood even if you have no Irish roots.

Since I have a new cabbage mashed potato recipe, Irish style, try taking the beef brisket this time, instead of boiling corned beef and cabbage.

BAKED CORNED BEEF Place corned beef in roaster with top, in 300 degree oven and bake two or three hours, depending on size of unit.

CARBAGE AND MASHED POTATOES IRISH STYLE 1 pound cabbage, cored and shredded, 1/2 cup chopped onion, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup chopped parsley, salt and pepper, 1 1/2 pounds boiling potatoes.
