Brown said he would return all severance tax receipts in excess of \$177 million to the counties.

Two-thirds of the return to the counties would be in the form of production and oil-widder funds to be divided among all the coal counties on a formula set by federal revenue sharing, based on population and several other factors.

Brown also proposed the enactment of a 4.6 percent severance tax on other depletable minerals and a 7 1/2 percent severance tax on oil and natural gas. The governor said he expected such a move would net the state approximately \$45 million over the biennium.

Budget proposals

In specific budgetary items, Brown's budget proposals include the following:

Expansion projects in the Development Cabinet such as \$600,000 over the biennium for an urban development office in Louisville, \$175,000 for the Washington, D.C. office, \$60,000 for expansion of a South American office, and \$4,345 million in debt service.

The recommended debt service will retire bonds proposed to be issued for projects associated with economic development, such as parks, restaurants and tourism. The bond issue is estimated at \$100 million.

A capital construction outlay of \$5 million associated with parks. It calls for small construction projects, upgrading for energy conservation, mechanical and structural upgrades, and roads and parking improvements.

Nearly \$16 million in expansion projects in the Department of Commerce, such as grants to Riverport Development Authority; expansion of the Kentucky Department of Transportation and Los Angeles offices; and the opening of a South American office.

A \$25 million appropriation for capital construction for a new 360-man correctional facility at an as yet

undetermined location. A \$17 million appropriation for renovation projects at the penitentiary and reformatory.

Expansion of staff and operating a new institution at Lexington.

A \$6 million appropriation to continue the 10 percent salary supplement program for the professional training of law enforcement officers and a total \$13 million appropriation for the enactment of such a program for Kentucky's firefighters.

A \$1.5 million appropriation for the development of a modern, comprehensive state financial management system.

A \$2.8 million appropriation for debt service payments on the Kentucky Center for the Arts in Louisville.

Increase in funding for exceptional children classroom units, the gifted and talented student program, improvement of the instructional services at the School for the Deaf and School for the Blind, and the opening of several new vocational schools across the state.

More than \$13 million over the biennium for salary adjustments of university employees.

Nearly \$1.5 million for the maintenance of the Maxey Flats hazardous waste site and approximately \$1.3 million for 26 new positions in the Division of Hazardous Waste Management. Funds are also included to implement an auto emissions inspection program.

Gov. Brown said he proposed budget "is a budget for difficult times. It reverses the trend of government trying to be all things to all people."

He said, "It reflects restraint with compassion, sensitivity with understanding and realistic reason."

The budget reflects an emphasis on economic development because Brown said the solution to the state's economic ills will come, "not from people paying more taxes, but from more people paying taxes."

Starring role

Elizabeth Watson began her acting career as a teen in a kindergarten production of "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs."

With one stage appearance and seven years of age under her belt, Elizabeth didn't let the chance to appear in a major motion picture being made in her native Letcher County pass by her.

Barbara Watson, located an advertisement in the local newspaper seeking children for parts in the film "Coal Miner's Daughter," a Universal Studios film about the life of singer/performer Loretta Lynn.

She and her husband, Claude, took Elizabeth and a recent photograph to the Cardinal Restaurant in Whitesburg. They filled out a form on their then seven-year-old daughter, left the photograph and waited at home by the telephone.

Elizabeth was called for two interviews with the film's director Michael Apted. He called her a third time to say she had been cast as Betty Sue, Loretta Lynn's oldest daughter.

Elizabeth shyly shrugs her shoulders and says she doesn't know why she was chosen out of several hundred mountain youths for the role. "Maybe it's because I look like her (Betty Sue)," she said.

"And she looks a lot like Stacy Speck," the film star who portrays the naïve Kentucky singer-performer, Mary Watson adds.

Taking two weeks from her second grade classes at West Whitesburg Elementary school, Elizabeth worked last spring on location with the cast and crew in Letcher County and Nashville. She said the most important part of her role was to call a big black dog to her.

"That was my favorite part," Elizabeth said.

Elizabeth heard several speaking lines in the original script, and she boasts she

still knows her lines. Her teacher last year, Cathy Collins, helped her memorize the part before she left school for the filming.

"I was the proud of her," Ms. Collins said. "I told everybody in the county that Elizabeth had the part because she was in my class."

Elizabeth had a little trouble re-adjusting to life at a Letcher County second grade after working with the stars for two weeks. "The kids in my grade used to bug me about it," she said, "but I don't think they were jealous."

Back to earth

On her first day in the classroom, Elizabeth spotted a "Coal Miner's Daughter" t-shirt given her by the "Universal crew." The t-shirt didn't believe that Elizabeth was in the movie at first. "Ms. Collins said, 'but that gave them good positive. We let her tell us all about her adventure. She came back to earth after a few days.'"

Mrs. Watson said Elizabeth's new-found stardom had quite an initial impact on her when she returned to her usual daily routine. "The crew waited on her hand and foot," Mrs. Watson said. "When Elizabeth would come home, she expected us to wait on her, she remembered real fast that's not how things work."

Elizabeth was paid about \$1,000 for nine days' work in "Coal Miner's Daughter." "She especially remembers making \$207 for working just 15 minutes on location in Nashville."

"I put some of the money in the bank and the rest I gave to my folks," Elizabeth said. "I kept some out to buy some clothes and toys."

Now eight-year-old, Elizabeth is looking forward to attending the world premiere of "Coal Miner's Daughter" in March 5 in Louisville. "I can't wait," she said.
