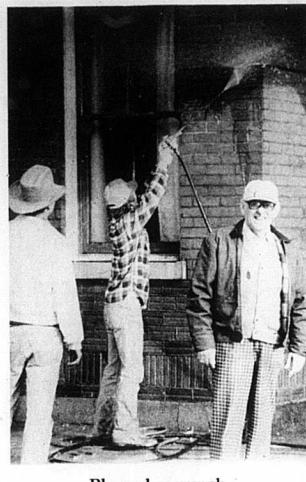
### Engagement announced

### College-bound Kentucky students score higher

College-bound Kentuckians have a one again score higher on the Scholastic Aptitude Test than the nation as a whole, according to figures recently released by the College Board. The test was used by many colleges and universities as one criteria for admission.

Kentucky students scored a total verbal mean of 471 and math mean of 507 compared to the national average of 441 in verbal skills and 466 in math. These figures are based on a top score of 800.

Kentucky has consistently ranked higher than the national sample mean and much higher than the southern region mean, according to Kentucky Department of Education officials.

The SAT has been a good indicator of how well Kentucky is teaching the basics," said Raymond Barber, superintendent of public instruction. "I am pleased to see this indicator continue to confirm that Kentucky is doing a good job of preparing students for college."

The test also includes questions concerning degree goals, colleges designated to receive scores and intended areas of study.

The test results indicate more female students plan to study biological sciences and related areas than male students. However, more men than women, however, designated physical sciences as related areas as their intended areas of study.

Of the females tested, 29.3 percent expect to study biological sciences with 23.6 percent concentrating on health and medical areas. Only 20.2 percent of the males selected biological sciences as their area of study with only 12.8 percent expected to concentrate on health and medical fields.

Some 34 percent of the male students chose physical sciences as their intended area of study with 24.3 percent of the group specifically interested in engineering. A low 8.4 percent of the females selected physical sciences as their area of study with only 1 percent interested in engineering.

More than half of the students taking the SAT in Kentucky said they plan to obtain a graduate degree while 25.8

### Sale of snack foods limited

A new federal regulation regarding the sale of snack foods in competition with federally subsidized meal programs in schools is in effect this fall. The rule limits until after last lunch period the sale of any food that has minimum nutritional value.

Purdue Maruyama, Extension foods and nutrition specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture explains, "Under the U.S. Department of Agriculture rule, a food has minimum nutritional value if it provides less than five percent of the U.S. recommended dietary allowances for each of eight basic nutrients."

The eight nutrients are protein, vitamin A, vitamin C, niacin, riboflavin, thiamin, calcium and iron. These are the same eight nutrients listed on nutrition information labels of selected foods. They are to be measured on a 100 calorie or serving size basis, says Maruyama.

Specifically restricted are four categories of foods: carbonated beverages, water ices, chewing gum, candies, (including hard candies, jellies and gums, marshmallow candies, fondants, licorice, spun candies and candy-coated popcorn). USDA encourages schools to replace foods in the restricted categories with more nutritious snacks, such as fresh fruit and fruit juices, vegetable juices

### and whole grain products.

Maruyama notes that many so-called junk foods are not covered by the regulation. For example, chocolate candies, potato chips, crackers and fruit pies, to name just a few, are not included in the restricted categories because they do not meet the USDA's definition of minimum nutritional value.

In addition, the judge who ruled to uphold the regulation in his 924 page report against the department said that USDA could not exempt certified foods from any of the restricted categories of food. Restrictions were concerned that the regulation would result in many fortified junk foods, such as chewing gum with added vitamins or iron-fortified carbonated beverages.

The Division of School Food Services in Kentucky is encouraging local school food authorities to adopt a stricter policy than USDA's as the new regulation is intended to be a minimum federal standard. Also, foods may be added to USDA's restricted categories by petition," says Maruyama.

Parents interested in local policies regarding the new regulation are encouraged to work with local school personnel.
