DR. WILLIAM R. WILLOUGHBY
Dr. William R. Willoughby, an educator and author, died Oct. 27 in New Brunswick, Canada.

He was a native of Bowen, Ky. and grew up at East Union and was a former member of the East Union Christian Church. He taught several years in the Nicholas County school system.

Willoughby, who retired in 1976, had served as acting chairman of the public relations department of the University of New Brunswick, since joining UNB in 1964. Prior to joining UNB he taught at Westworth Military Academy in Lexington, Mo., the Morehead State Teachers' College, now Morehead University, in Morehead, Ky., and St. Lawrence University in Canton, N.Y.

He was a research associate in international relations at the state department in Washington, D.C. from 1945-46, and spent two years in the 1950s at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, N.J. He was a member of the John Hopkins School of International Studies in Washington, D.C. in 1970 and 1971, while on sabbatical from UNB.

Dr. Willoughby was the recipient of a number of research grants, including two Canada Council leave fellowships. He held BA and MA degrees from the University of Kentucky and his PhD from the University of Wisconsin.

He wrote two books, "The St. Lawrence Waterway - A Study in Politics and Diplomacy and Canadian-American Inter-governmental Machinery and Relations." He also authored numerous articles in professional journals.

He is survived by his wife, Rudeck Cox Willoughby, a son, Robert, Buffalo, N.J.; a daughter, Mary Alice Belyea, Ontario; a grandchild, three sisters, Mrs. Lurley Price, Clay City, Ky.; Miss Oma Willoughby, Frankfort, Ky.; and Mrs. James Keating, Flemingsburg, Ky.

Campbell promoted

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will bring the division of security and compliance under the command of a sworn state police officer. He will succeed Gregory L. Williamson, a civilian state police employee whose position as director of that division was terminated earlier this month.

Until now, security and compliance was the only division not headed by a sworn state police officer.
Fetzer said that putting a career state police officer in charge of the security and compliance division would strengthen the command relationship between it and the other divisions and, "given Campbell's extensive experience both as a working trooper and state police commander, will promote its growth and development as a security and enforcement agency with special responsibilities to the people of Kentucky."

The division of security and compliance was established within the state police last March to provide security coverage for all of Kentucky's state parks, enforce water safety laws and regulations on all of the state's waterways and maintain the safe flow of commercial carrier traffic on the highways.

It also is charged with the security of nearly all state-owned and leased property in Franklin County, including the state Capitol.

Fetzer also said that he is naming Lt. Kenneth R. Smith, former commander of the KSP planning unit at Frankfort, to succeed Campbell as post commander at Dry Ridge. Smith, 41, is an 18-year veteran state police officer who served as a trooper at Lebanon and Pikeville and as an assistant commander at the state police academy before being reassigned to the planning unit.

Smith is a graduate of both Eastern Kentucky University and Kentucky State University where he earned two master's degrees in police administration and public affairs.

Campbell, 39, also is a graduate of Eastern Kentucky University with a master's degree in public administration. He has been with the KSP since

1964, serving first as a trooper at Morehead and later as a detective there.

Prior to his assignment as post commander at Dry Ridge, he served as post commander at Harlan and as assistant training commander at the police academy. He also has served in a variety of other command-level, investigative posts at state police headquarters in Frankfort.

Powers, 44, joined the state police in 1957 and, except for brief assignments as post commander at Pikeville and commander of KSP supply, has spent most of his career in criminal investigations, both as a detective and investigative commander.

Further also announced, "with regret the upcoming retirement on Nov. 1 of Capt. Felix C. Atwood, our communications commander and one of the most knowledgeable experts in that field which I have ever encountered."
