Take your pick of formats

There are many different types and formats of cameras available today. Before purchasing which is best for you, you should be aware of some of the strengths and weaknesses of each of the commonly available camera formats.

110 Compact. This petite, usually pocket-size camera accepts easy-loading 110 cartridge film which requires no threading and a minimum of handling. The 110 cartridge camera is compact, travel friendly and carries on the edge of the occasional snaphooter-on-the-go who likes to travel. Several models, however, feature more sophisticated construction. One accepts interchangeable lenses.

35mm Compact Camera. This type of camera accepts 35mm film in the familiar cassette. The format of film by far the most widely available, coming in color print, color slide, black-and-white print, and specialty types. These cameras are somewhat larger than 110 cartridge cameras, though all are compact and fairly light. Most feature more sophisticated construction than the cartridge cameras and carry higher price tags, although "snapping around can produce some excellent bargains.

Focusing with 35mm compact cameras varies from fixed focus (where the lens is preset to deliver sharp images within a fixed range, usually from about 6 feet to infinity) to estimated focusing, coupled rangefinder focusing, and even automatic focusing, depending upon the camera.

35mm Single Lens Reflex. This camera has slowly evolved over the years to become the most popular camera in the world. Its chief advantage over other types of cameras is that by means of a light reflecting prism and a mirror, the user can actually view through the same lens that places the image on film. The photographer gets to see exactly what the camera "sees."

Instant-Print. Back in the early 1960s, the instant camera was looked upon as a lark. It was fun to play with, but not of much value. Today, the entire world of camera has thought otherwise. The photographer who wants immediate gratification in the instant-print camera has found a place in the world. It is available in color, black and white, and special-purpose styles. Styles of instant-print cameras are available in a wide range of viewfinder lenses and even auto-focusing models. They're ideal for the photographer who doesn't want to develop negatives, for the person who wants results now.

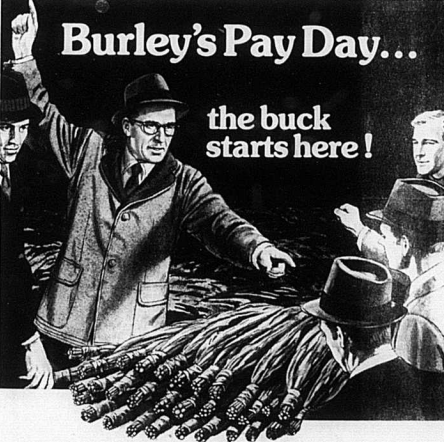
