Cynthiana, Ky. The victim was Beulah Dale McCullough, age 26, of Poplar Street, Cynthiana. She was shot three times with a small caliber gun. The investigation is being handled by Det. Joe Conley of the Kentucky State Police and Sgt. Doug Coy of the Cynthiana Police Department.

## Moreheads first since 1968 No-hitter by Mattox

Mike Mattox, son of Mrs. Floyd Bassett, Carlisle, will finish his second season as a pitcher for Morehead State University's baseball team.

Mike pitched a no-hitter game against Northern Kentucky University Sept. 19. The final score of that game was 2-1. This was Morehead's first no-hitter game since 1968.

This past summer Mike found his time occupied playing baseball and working in Grand Rapids, Michigan. He played on a seniors league team sponsored by Polynesian Pools. The team's record was 7-6. The baseball team owned by the pool company also employed the team members.

Mike's past record marks dedication, hard work and success with each season. In the past two years Mike has compiled a record of four wins, two losses, five saves and a 3.50 earned run average.

Mike was voted the most outstanding relief pitcher during his freshman year with one win, no losses, four saves and a 2.0 earned run average.

## Jackets defeated

Receiving the ball at the beginning of the first quarter the Bulldogs were able to complete six first downs and a touchdown. Jim Merhan ran forty yards to accomplish the first six points of the game. Butch Asher kicked for the extra point making the score 7-0 at the end of the first quarter.

At the start of the second quarter, Hazard fumbled in the first play and Robert Sooby was able to rescue the ball for the Jackets. Hazard regained possession of the ball after a jacket punt, but was soon to fumble the ball again, which was recovered by Todd Allison. Midway through the quarter the Bulldogs were able to come back and score another touchdown on a two yard run by Ace Chaney. Asher kicked for another extra point which left the Jackets hanging at a score of 14-0 at the end of the first half.

Beginning the third quarter the Bulldogs were yet to score another touchdown on a 31-yard run by Steve Marsh. Asher attempted to kick another extra point but Jimmy Dale pushed past the line to block it. With a new line of attack the Jackets began pulling back after a few minutes into

the third quarter with their first touchdown. With a sudden spur of energy, David McCreffer ran 69 yards for the touchdown. The conversion, an attempted pass from McCreffer to Allison, failed. The Bulldogs fumbled the ball into the hands of the Jackets after the first few plays following the kick off. The Jackets then fumbled the ball right back to the Bulldogs. To end the Hazard's scoring game for the night, Chapman completed a 30 yard pass to Merhan. The extra point attempt failed after a five-yard penalty against Hazard.

The Bulldogs lost the ball once again at the beginning of the fourth quarter to Mark Taylor. This fumble proved to get the Jackets into full swing with a touchdown pass from freshman Steve Anderson to Donald Markland for 18 yards. Mike Sowell's attempt to kick for the extra point failed.

The last fumble for Hazard proved to help the Jackets at another touchdown before seven plays had passed since the previous. Anderson was able to make a 30-yard pass to Markland to get the Jackets six yards from the goal line. Barry Frost then ran for the last jacket touchdown of the evening. The conversion was completed by a pass from Sorrell to Markland.

The Jackets suffered 75 yards in penalties to the Bulldogs five but this did not stop them from gaining 10 first downs.
