CHICKEN SALAD

1 1/2 cups real mayonnaise, not salad dressing
1 cup diced celery
1 tablespoon soy sauce
1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 1/2 teaspoons curry powder, optional

University of Louisville honors William Schwann

William Schwann, a former resident of Carlisle and a graduate of the Carlisle High School class of 1930 was honored last week when the University of Louisville presented him with the University's Distinguished Alumni Award. The award was presented in a special convocation in the Recital Hall of the new music building on the Belknap Campus.

The University of Louisville awarded Schwann an honorary doctor of music degree in 1960.

In 1930, after graduating from U of L, Schwann enrolled in Boston University's Graduate School of Music, followed by a year of graduate work in the music department at Harvard.

In the late Thirties he spent a year studying with the noted music scholar and organist, E. Power Biggs and free lanced as a music critic for the Boston Herald. In 1939 he opened "The Record Shop" in Cambridge, Mass. and typed the first edition of the "Schwenn Record Catalog" in 1940. Since that time his name has become a "household" word among music critics, record dealers and serious collectors throughout the world.

Originally designed as a quick reference guide for his own record store, the Schwann Record and Tape Guide has grown from a 26-page booklet listing 400 recordings to one issued by 11 companies, to a two-volume, 31-page compilation of nearly 60,000 entries issued by 800 recording firms world wide.

Schwann has had his remunerative business in 1979 to ABC Leisure Magazines, publishers of High Fidelity. He remains
