**Kay's Kitchen**

This has really been my lucky week. Just when I felt desperate about what to write on this week, I got a recipe in the mail that is perfect for this time of year, and a phone call giving a wonderful hint on using pears.

**CROCKPOT APPLE BUTTER**  
1 cup unsweetened applesauce  
5 cups sugar  
2 cups vinegar  
Cook 8 hours or overnight in covered crockpot on low.

**PEAR CONSERVE**  
1 peck pears  
4 lbs. sugar  
1 lb. raisins, seeded  
1 1/2 lbs. English walnut meats  
2 lemons, juice  
2 oranges, juice

Any good apple recipe, pie, pudding or most anything you would use calling for apples, substitute pears. It seems there is an abundant crop this year. This from Mrs. Helen Fisher of the Dog Walk Pike.

Now I have this suggestion. Start getting together in groups for making Pecan Cake, Plum Puddings, and any Christmas goodies you may be making for Christmas. They are expensive, and buying a few at a time will be less painful. I hope! All the things will keep on a cool pantry shelf, or in the freezer.

**PICKLED PEARS**  
12 lbs. pears, peeled  
2 lbs. sugar  
2 cups vinegar  
2 cups water  
2 cups salt  
2 cups black pepper  
2 cups red hot sauce  
2 cups cider vinegar

**PEAR PRESERVES**  
Boil 4 cups sugar and 2 1/2 cups water together 8 minutes; add 2 pounds of pears, peeled, cut in half and cores. Add 1/2 cup lemon juice and 1 lemon thinly sliced; cook until pears are clear and tender, about 15 minutes. Let stand in syrup after cooking is completed for several hours; pour up the fruit. Roll up to boiling, pump into jars and seal at once.

**FRANKFORT** - As part of its commitment to promote patriotism and Americanism, the Kentucky Society of the Sons of the American Revolution is sponsoring an ROTC recognition program at high schools and colleges throughout the state.

According to Dr. John Herrick, president of the Kentucky society, the objectives of the program are to provide positive support for professors of military science and tactics at the high school and college levels and to provide support for ROTC professors at their respective schools.

Criteria for selection of the medal winner include above average academic performance, excellent physical appearance in military bearing, courtesy and general outward appearance. The award ceremony will be held at the high school or college level with a luncheon of the characteristics, Herrick said.

Medals will be presented next May or June at all schools having an ROTC program. Presentation will be made by the chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution nearest the particular school. In the case that there is not a chapter near the school, the state headquarters will make the presentation, Herrick said.

The Sons of the American Revolution has 13 active chapters in the state with more than 400 members whose ancestors contributed in some way to the American Revolution.

### State General Fund is up \$8.5 million

The total General Fund is up \$8.5 million or 2.4 percent for the first two months of fiscal 1981 over 1980, according to a report issued recently by Finance Secretary George Adams. Adams said \$16 million is in coal severance; \$ 8 million is oil production (due to an increase in rate); and \$6.5 million is in individual income tax (largely due to \$5.9 million more of refunds being made in July 1979 than in July 1980). The total State Transportation Fund shows a decline for July-August 1980 from July-August 1979 of \$3 million or -8.7 percent. This is a little misleading since the major source of tax receipts is motor fuels and there was a carry-over into September of almost \$3 million in these receipts this year. If all motor fuel taxes had been processed as of August 1980 as they were in August 1979, the total fuel taxes would have been -6.0 percent, tax receipts would have been -3.8 percent rather than -18.3 percent, and motor fuels alone normally would show -6.4 percent rather than -18.9 percent, Adams said.
