Coal companies fined

Five coal companies in Kentucky have been fined \$129,000 in civil penalties for violation of state surface mining and reclamation requirements, according to orders filed with the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection. The fines range from \$20,000 to \$25,000. The two largest fines totaling \$129,000 were levied against Inco Inc. and Calvary Enterprises Inc. The fines were accompanied by forfeited bonds from both companies which will be held by individual associations with the companies from future strip mining in Kentucky.
Located in Bowling Green, Inco Inc. was fined and its permit revoked for removing all reclamation equipment from the site before completion of backfilling and grading and never returning to complete it. Thirty-nine acres in Warren County were involved. A reclamation bond for \$1,000 was forfeited by Calvary Enterprises Inc. and will go for reclamation of site. The Madisonville company was charged with discharging acid water from its mine site, depositing and filling a drainage ditch, having a company address on the permit sign, not marking contaminated topsoil, locating a hauldrome of the permitted area, having a slide on the east end and having inadequate silt control.
The permit was revoked due to the "unacceptable serious environmental degradation resulting from these particular types of violations," stated the order.

Solar energy to heat State rest area

Kentucky's first rest area to use solar energy as its major heating source is scheduled to open along westbound I-64 in Carter County this fall.
About 60 percent of the building's heat will be generated by 27 solar energy collectors — covering an area of 1,600 square feet — located near the rest area, according to Russell Ingram, design engineer for the State Department of Transportation.
While the solar heating system initially costs about \$2,000 to \$30,000 more than conventional heating and cooling systems, electrical energy consumption should be cut in half, Ingram says. "We expect the savings to be substantial," he said.
Other energy-efficient features are incorporated in the design of the rest area, Ingram said.
"Each burner" — five-foot-tall dirt mounds sloping against the outside of the building — act as natural insulation. The burners are covered with stone and vegetation to prevent erosion.
Innovated front windows face south and are shaded by an overhang designed to block out the summer sun. Since the sun shines at a smaller angle during winter months, its rays will come unobstructed into the rest area's interior, helping to heat the inside of the building, Ingram explained.
The building also has a "high-efficiency heat exchange system" in which exhausted, heated air helps heat incoming fresh air. Since air-circulating exhaust systems are required in rest-area buildings, energy is wasted heating fresh outside air after it is in the building, Ingram said. The high-efficiency system heats the air as it enters, he said.
Currently final work on the interior of the building and completion of the sewage treatment system is being done. Work on the picnic area will follow, Ingram said.

New law

FRANKFORT — A new state law sanctioning the recitation of the pledge of allegiance to the flag in public schools is not unconstitutional, according to one of several attorney general's opinions recently released.
Because it does not require public recitation, the law "as it relates to the pledge of allegiance violates no provision of either the United States or Kentucky constitutions," Deputy Attorney General Robert L. Chenoweth said.

According to the opinion, requested by Tifford L. Underwood, assistant superintendent of the McCracken County Public Schools, the law directs each public local school district to have adopted, by Aug. 1, a policy where "the pupils in each elementary school may participate in the pledge of allegiance... at the commencement of each school day."
