On Sept. 15, Mr. Watrous will discuss antibiotics. Dave Tomlin will speak on the subject of Current Drug on the 16th and on Drug Interaction and Incompatibility on Sept. 17.

Objectives of the conference will be: (1) Identification of major classification of new drugs; (2) Identification of drug classifications that are compatible and incompatible; (3) Description of the pharmacodynamics of new antibiotics and (4) Identification of the implications of the topics for registered nurse actions. A fee of \$10 will cover the entire cost of the workshop.

Voter registration cards required

Secretary of State Frances Jones Mills, chairman of the State Board of Elections, has implemented procedures to carry out legislation as enacted in Senate Bill 33. This bill, introduced by Senator Tom Eastery, amended the law relating to voter registration notification cards.

Originally a voter registration card was given to each voter as they registered in the County Clerk's office at the voter registration outside the Clerk's office, this method became impossible to carry out.

The amended legislation now requires that the state board of elections shall prepare and issue to each elector registered after July 1, 1979, a registration notification card of convenient size containing the name and residence

address of the elector, the name or number of the precinct in which the elector resides, and a brief statement of the circumstances under which the elector is required to register.

The Board of Elections of the Secretary of State's office maintains by computer, complete records of every registered voter in Kentucky, and supplies each county, by precinct, prior to each election, a validated list of all eligible voters in the county.

"This new system assures the voter that he is properly registered and entered into the master system," said Mrs. Mills. "The card will be retained by the registrant until he moves or otherwise makes a change in this registration at which time a new card will be issued," Mrs. Mills concluded.

What do grouse hunters and bluegill fishermen have in common?

For one thing, they're both facing deadlines this month—at least one of each group are.

Grouse (or hawk) hunters who wish to hunt on the Ballard Wildlife Management Area in Western Kentucky must have their letters of application post-marked no later than Sept. 21 to be included in the drawing to select who hunts on the area.

Apply by letter enclosing a self-addressed, stamped envelope. Give the names and addresses of each member of the party (no more than six per letter, please) and list several alternatives choices of hunting dates. List your preference for duck or grouse hunting and enclose a fee of \$10 per hunter. Only cashiers' checks, certified checks or money orders will be accepted—no don't send cash or personal checks. Mail to Ballard Wildlife Management Area, Route One, LeCenter, Ky. 40646 and write the word "reservations" on the outside of the envelope.

Ballard area will run from Dec. 8 through Jan. 15, with hunting on Sundays or on Christmas Day. Other area regulations will be provided to those whose names are drawn. Those who don't make it will be notified and will get their \$10 back.

The annual deadline for accepting post-marked stock applications is Oct. 1. If your application isn't in by then, you'll have to wait an entire year before your pond can be stocked.

Organization is the key to every successful system and this is especially true in using these new people walk through piles of papers and not using them. They're trying to find specific ones. But if you're really busy, you can live with hundreds of cash bills and still use your furnace. All it takes is a large envelope or shoebox and a set of labeled cardboard dividers. Q How do I best organize my coupon file?

A There are several filing systems that most of us — called "coupon" by their expiration date, or a combination of both. The system best for me — each type of clip is arranged in alphabetical order by brand, and then organized so that the ones closed to expiration lead each pack. For example, under "Folger's" I might have Bona, Bona Cadillac, etc., with the nearest dates of each brand in front.
