Unemployed Kentuckians exhaust benefit funds

FRANKFORT — More than 5,000 unemployed Kentuckians have exhausted their 26-week maximum benefits from unemployment insurance, the Department for Human Resources announced recently. They were the first

to receive the 13-week extension to the normal 26-week unemployment insurance benefit period, which became effective in Kentucky June 1.

The federal government announced that because of national economic trends, states not already offering extended benefits would offer them beginning Aug. 24.

Late last week the federal government announced the 13-week extended benefit period originally scheduled to begin Aug. 24 would be retroactive to July 20.

Since Kentucky began the extended 13 weeks of benefits early, this meant many of Kentucky's unemployed have been eligible for extended unemployment insurance benefits since June. That is seven weeks longer than unemployed workers in many other states, said Huck Crawford, director for

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Woodburning workshop set

An exhibit of wood burning stoves, fireplace inserts, chain saws, log splitters and other devices engineered to help homeowners save energy in heating their residences will be held at Maryville Community College Sept. 30 from 10 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. The exhibit is jointly sponsored by MCC, Murray State University and the Kentucky Department of Energy. This will be the first in a series of three programs organized to promote the Kentucky Energy Conservation Plan.

Area residents who have been considering the possibility of alternative heating sources are encouraged to visit the exhibit to see the many types of wood burning devices available. Fisher, Village Ironworks, Black, Timberline, Korosun, Birmingham and Kenmore are the brand names of heating devices that will be on display. Craftsman, McCalloch, Husqvarna, Homelite and Stihl are the brand names of saws and wood cutting devices that will be shown. Over ten representatives of

various manufacturers and distributors of these products will be on hand to answer questions about their equipment.

In addition to company representatives, energy experts will be available to discuss energy saving practices with those attending the exhibit. Audio-visual presentations will be shown and energy conservation literature will be available. The display will be set up on the front yard of the Maryville Community College campus and will be housed in a gigantic tent furnished by the U.S. Army Reserve. Most of the dealers represented at the program will award door prizes to those who register at the exhibit. Door prizes already announced include a chain saw, three meals, a country ham, a cookbook, eight-piece cast iron cookware set, and a brass handled fireplace set. Other energy conservation programs and workshops have been scheduled for Oct. 28 and Nov. 11.

Obtain wood burning stoves thru NCCAC

Wood burning stoves available through the Nicholas County Community Action Center are available to low income families for a nominal fee. The stoves can be purchased at a reduced rate by families at or below the poverty guidelines. The cost for low income families is \$95 for a 14-inch fire box and \$100 for a 16-inch diameter fire box.

Stoves may also be purchased by families above the poverty guidelines but below gross income level of \$12,000 for a family of two (\$500 is added for

each additional family member). For families who fall within this income range, a 14-inch stove is \$175 and a 16-inch stove is \$200.

All stoves must be paid for in cash or by certified check at the time of pickup. The Center will not deliver or install the stoves.

Information given the Mercury for publication in the Aug. 28 issue was incorrect when it stated there was no charge for the stoves to low income families.

All 120 counties eligible for aid

According to the Senators, farmers in each county may apply for emergency loan assistance to recover crop and pasture losses caused by the heat wave. Applications for emergency loans should be filed in Farmers Home (FmHA) County Offices. The applications for physical and production losses will be accepted for nine months, until May 28, 1981.

The Farmers Home Administration has advised Senators Wendell Ford and Walter D. Henderson that 120 counties in Kentucky have been declared eligible for emergency loan assistance because of the excessive heat, high temperatures, and drought during the period from June 1 to August 1 this summer.

The extent in dollars of crop and pasture losses has not yet been determined. According to Senator Ford, the growing season and harvest must be nearly completed before an exact estimate may be made.
