### Burley tobacco situation

Recent statistics indicate an increase in burley tobacco production throughout the eight state burley belt, according to Wilson Hourigan, Extension economist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

The Department for Human Resources reports that burley production for the burley belt at 546 million pounds, up 22 percent from the 1979 crop. "The Kentucky crop is estimated at a total of 379 million pounds, 17 million more than last year's crop," says Hourigan.

Price support for eligible tobacco is 14 percent beyond the present level of \$1.69 per pound, the support level for the 1980 crop is \$1.80 per pound, and may go as high as \$1.90 per pound.

### Geographic studies made for solar heat

Pudach (McCracken County) appears to be the best place in Kentucky to build a solar-heated house, while Covington (Kentucky County) is possibly the worst, according to a new study funded by the Kentucky Department of Energy.

The study, Assessment of Solar Heating Potential in Kentucky - Residential and Agricultural, was conducted by Drs. R.P. Parker, D.G. Collier and L.W. Turner, all of the University of Kentucky's College of Agricultural Engineering.

The authors conclude that Western Kentucky has the least favorable solar radiation during the winter than the Lexington area. The study focused on a solar-heated home in Lexington, but it also reaches some broader conclusions.

"With a predicted 30 percent year increase in conventional fuel costs," according to the authors, "most solar heating systems analyzed would be economically unfeasible."

"Passive solar heating should be considered by anyone building a residence today and careful attention should be given to design, heat storage, and management," the study noted.

The essential difference between active and passive solar systems is the method of collection and distribution of the energy. Active systems rely on mechanical devices, such as fans and pumps, to move the heat stored in their collectors. Passive systems utilize only natural means of distribution, such as conduction and convection of air currents.

The study listed the following general guidelines for anyone interested in constructing a more energy-efficient home:

Energy conservation can be achieved by building as far below ground as is feasible and insulation and weather-proofing should be fully utilized.

Utilize passive solar heat by placing most of the windows on the south side of the house with provisions for shade during the summer and for insulating during the winter months.

Consider active solar collectors with heat storage.

Since Louisville and Lexington are close to the median weather conditions for the state and are large construction growth areas, the analysis was based on a house in the Lexington area.

The residence used for this study had 1,600 square feet of glass windows and doors, was caulked and weather-stripped, and had R-30 and R-11 insulation in the ceiling, floor and walls, respectively. Both liquid and air-type collectors were studied in the hypothetical home.

If fuel costs escalate at the predicted 30 percent per year, a solar heating system would be economical and competitive at \$20 per square foot installed.

### Burley pool's holdings sold, first time ever

A complete sale of pool tobacco holdings, plus a sharp drop in this year's crop forecast, have stirred talk of increased burley production quotas for 1981.

For the first time since price supports began in 1950, the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association has sold off its entire burley pool holdings. The last of the unpaid loan tobacco, reduced to only \$62,809 pounds by the recent buyback wave, was taken last weekend by several dealers and manufacturers.

As with the earlier purchases over the past 30 days, involving a total of over 26 million pounds, the final sweep of pool storage stocks was in deferred sales, said Alvin R. Beckley, executive secretary-treasurer of the Burley Association. Delivery could be as much as a year later.

There is increasing talk of a scarcity of burley. The September crop forecast by the USDA shows 30 million pounds from August. The indicated yield per acre is lower than in 1979, and in 1981, as dry weather reduced prospects over most of the burley belt.

This would mean the third crop in a row. Last year's 446 million pound output was the smallest in years, and the 1978 marketing of 613 million also were down from normal. This year's crop, at present estimates, would be 10 percent over last year's reduced output.

The latest forecast of the Crop Reporting Board placed this year's production at 546 million pounds, down from 576 million a month earlier.

Last winter when the national quota was renewed at 615 million pounds, burley leaders were talking about a 500-million-pound crop for 1980. Now the prospects are one million pounds below that figure.

Rising exports are cutting into an already reduced carryover, according to "Tobacco Situation," a USDA publication. For the first seven months of the marketing year, burley exports reached 95 million pounds, up from 28 million from the year earlier.

The September issue of "Tobacco Situation" says the 1980/81 supply of U.S. burley totals 3 percent less than a year earlier. Current supply represents 2 1/2 years use, which is below the desired level, and provides less than adequate stocks for aging.

The question of increased production, and the reported scarcity of burley in the world market are topics certain to be aired next month at a three-day meeting of tobacco leaders at Owensboro, Ky. This will be the 31st annual convention, Oct. 5-7, of the Burley and Dark Leaf Tobacco Export Association.
