Bluegrass agencies to assist with consumer problems

In this age of runaway inflation, few people would argue that consumer protection is a highly needed commodity. For consumers to be aware of their rights and buying power has become essential.

Attorney General Steve Beshear has announced that the consumer protection division, along with the Department for Human Resources Bureau for Social Insurance and many community service agencies in the Bluegrass area, will soon begin a concentrated effort to assist low-income individuals with consumer problems.

While the role of the social insurance agencies will be limited, the agencies will serve as the main base for the distribution of consumer-related information. Bureau offices in each county of the Bluegrass district will be supplied with consumer information literature, complaint forms and a listing of community agencies available to provide further assistance.

The established network of community service agencies will serve as the prime resource to assist consumers in how to fill out and how to file a consumer complaint.

Though the initial area affected will be in the Bluegrass district, the program is expected to expand to cover all 15 area development districts of Kentucky. Tobacco Sales going up

Burley tobacco news this week is highlighted by more sales of old stock pooled leaf, new and higher leaf rates for the 1980 market, and good progress in harvesting the current crop.

Loan stocks except 71,226 pounds from last year's crop have now been sold. The August buying wave which took 21 1/2 million pounds has continued into September, with an additional 2 million pounds being taken by the trade on Sept. 3, 4 and 5.

Reporting pool stocks down to their lowest level in 40 years, Alvin R. Beckley, executive secretary-treasurer of the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association, said the first week in September took all remaining 1977 and 1978 leaf, plus 1.5 million pounds of 1979, for total sales of 1,960,789 pounds.

It is the first time on record that loan stocks held by the Association have fallen below 1 million pounds, since price supports started in 1941.

With their affairs in excellent shape, burley growers can still save a few dollars for the situation in the flour-cured industry down south, in the view of some burley officials.

In contrast with the near sellout of burley loan stocks, the sales of flour-cured have been declining, with unsmoked stocks now totaling about 516 million pounds, or nearly one-half of a year's production.

USDA recently decided against allowing flour-cured sales directly to export customers, a plan which had been proposed to help reduce the large loan holdings of Flour-Cured Tobacco Cooperative Stabilization Corp.

About one-fourth of the 1980 burley crop has now been cut, and curing weather has been favorable over the belt, according to reports reaching the Burley Association. The USDA crop report for Kentucky, where most burley is grown, says that over all the crop is mostly of fair quality, with more good reports than bad.

Support rates are up about 9.4 percent on the average above 1979, with the average level at \$16.96 per hundred pounds. The new rate schedule released by Washington shows rates ranging from 95 cents to \$1.62 per pound.

The grade rate on B1P (choice tan leaf) is \$1.60 compared with last year's \$1.48, and C1P (choice tan leaf) is \$1.61, up from last year's \$1.48. Similar grade increases are shown throughout the schedule.
