

# Journalism Hall of Fame induction and Creason lecture at UK April 13

Seventeen distinguished journalists will be inducted into the new Kentucky Journalism Hall of Fame at the National Broadcasting University of Kentucky on April 13.

On the same day, Tom Wicker, associate editor of The New York Times, will deliver the fourth annual Joe Creason Lecture.

The honorees may be natives of the state or persons who have spent a significant portion of their careers in Kentucky working in newspaper or broadcast journalism.

The first recipients are:

- Barney Arnold, longtime farm director of WLSL in Louisville who drove his retirement award average \$300,000 miles a year covering agricultural programs and people in the state.
- William B. Arthur, executive director of the National News Council, former editor of Look Magazine and past national president of the Society of Professional Journalists (Sigma Delta Chi).
- Clay Wade Bailey, veteran Frankfort reporter for The Courier-Journal, Herald and Leader and West Press International. He died in 1974.
- Barry Bingham Sr., chairman of the board of The Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times and former editor and publisher of the newspapers.

Joe Creason, feature writer and columnist for The Courier-Journal, best known for his coverage of the Danville Kentucky. He died in 1974.

Hernon J. Evans, former editor of The Lexington Herald and the Louisville Times. He was an ardent conservationist and proponent of the state park system in Kentucky. He died in 1974.

Levin Gilbert, meteorologist and anchor for WAVE in Louisville for almost 40 years and a television pioneer. He died Feb. 7, 1981.

— Julian Goodman, former chairman of the board and chief executive officer of the National Broadcasting Company, a strong advocate for freedom of broadcasting.

— George Gretna, founder of the University of Kentucky Department of Journalism in 1914 who served as head of it until 1977. He died in 1977.

— Dr. L.J. Hartin, founder of the Institute for Journalism Education at Murray State University who also worked for a number of newspapers and wire services. He retired from Murray in 1974.

— George Joplin Jr., former editor and publisher of the Somerset Commonwealth, now the Commonwealth-Journal. His newspaper received more than 75 awards for journalistic excellence during his career. He died in 1980.

— Jerry Shackelford, former editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal and past national president of the Society of Professional Journalists (Sigma Delta Chi).

— Albert P. Smith Jr., of Russellville, publisher of three newspapers in Western Kentucky and former producer of the weekly Kentucky Educational Television program. Most recently co-chairman of the Appalachian Regional Commission in Washington.

— Enoe Swain, former editor and general manager of the Paducah Advocate-Advertiser. Noted historian, author, racecourse, and strong advocate for press rights.

— Edwards M. Temple, state and national leader in newspaper promotion, former promotion director for the Lexington Herald-Leader. He died in 1974.

— Helen Thomas, chief of United Press International's White House bureau. First woman elected president

**SEASONAL WEEDS HELPER IN SIGHT**  
Landowners with property adjacent to state-owned right of way that are Johnson grass, giant foxtail, Canada thistle, nodding thistle and multi-flora roses.

"Destroying the noxious weeds is just the right of way or just the adjoining property does not solve the problem," said George Franke, assistant state highway engineer. "Burners or herbicides used need care as the weeds to crop up again."

A joint effort between the state and the property owners is made to destroy the noxious weeds, he said.

Landowners wishing to work with the Department of Transportation to rid their property of noxious weeds must submit a written application to the highway district office in their area. Applications and addresses of each district office will be located at state highway maintenance barns.
