Ky. exports increased 18% in fiscal 1980

The value of Kentucky's agricultural commodities exported during the year ending Sept. 30, 1980 increased 18 percent from the previous fiscal year, according to statistics released by the Economics and Statistics Service of the USDA and the Kentucky Crop Reporting Service. The value of Kentucky agricultural commodities exported for the year ending Sept. 30, 1980 totaled \$651.1 million. This compares with \$551.7 million for the same period a year earlier.

Kentucky remains second, behind only North Carolina, in revenues from the export of tobacco. Kentucky garnered \$185.1 million from the export of this product with most of it from luxury, Sophomora and topsoil products accounted for the largest export dollar for Kentucky's agricultural commodities with \$204.5 million, up 20 percent from the previous fiscal year. Tobacco accounted for 14 percent over the same period.

Feed grains and related products ranked third among Kentucky's agricultural exports, accounting for \$177.3 million in sales, up 29 percent from last year. Wheat and wheat products showed a significant increase of 68 percent from \$19.1 million the previous year to \$33.8 million this year. Meat
