News briefly

BURLEY NEWS
The local Agricultural Soil Conservation Service (ASCS) office has finally collected all tobacco marketing cards for 1980. The final tabulation of sales shows that Nicholas County tobacco producers sold 4,660,389 pounds out of an effective quota of 6,517,301. This indicates that the county was short 28 percent for the year, as compared to a 23 percent shortage in 1979. There were 13,019 pounds of excess shortage that were sold in 1980, and was therefore lost for 1981. The 1981 county effective total will be approximately 7,595,239 pounds. This figure includes 1,892,657 pounds of shortage from 1980.
