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Wildlife open house is Friday

The Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources will hold an open house Friday, April 24, between noon and 6 p.m. at its new headquarters, the former Mitchell Building, located at the Game Farm, five miles west of Frankfort on U.S. 60 (Shelbyville Road).

The public is invited to come take a first-hand look at the "house that sportsmen built." The \$1.8 million building was paid for through regular fish and wildlife funds, which come primarily from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses. No general state revenue was used and the building was paid for in full before construction began, making this building, if not unique, at least most unusual among governmental edifices.

A highlight of the open house will be the unveiling of an exhibition of wildlife art. The works of at least 30 Kentucky wildlife artists will be on permanent display in the lobby of the building.

"As far as we know, this is the only place in the state where such a collection of works by Kentucky artists will be displayed for 15 days, the department's contention.

The building is named in honor of the conservationist, Arnold L. Mitchell, whose professional career in state management of wildlife and game resources began in 1919 and who served as director of the department from 1925 to 1935.

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Flemingsburg to host Arts and Crafts Fair

Historic Flemingsburg, on the outer edge of the Bluegrass, will host its first Covered Bridge Festival and Arts and Crafts Fair May 6, 8 and 9, according to Mrs. Nancy Henderson, president of the Flemingsburg Chamber of Commerce, which is sponsoring the event.

Fleming County is the home of three covered bridges. These aged objects, architectural reminders of our great past have frequently been used in photographic and written essays as symbols of an old and distinguished culture.

The festival's immediate goal is to raise money for a fund to restore and maintain these quaint, rickety covered bridges.

Highlights of the festival include antique and classic car show, antique show, arts and crafts show, including a display of old folk dancing and folk music, historic three parade, pancake breakfast, periodic fashion show, black powder and primitive weapons show, and a historic horse show.

In addition, various dance competitions will mark an integral part of the three day festivities. There will be clogging contests and lots of square dancing. These will be divided into different age groups.

Area musicians, including fiddle and banjo players will perform traditional Bluegrass or country music each day.

So, plan to come to Fleming County May 6, 8 and 9. Enjoy yourself, participate in the events that appeal to you and meet old and new friends.
