Huddleston Farm Bill highlights

Senator Walter (Dee) Huddleston has introduced sweeping farm legislation designed to continue the federal programs that contribute to stability and price protection for farmers and beneficial supplies at reasonable prices for consumers. In addition, the bill would slash nearly half a billion dollars from the food stamp program while assuring that qualified, needy recipients continue to receive benefits. Huddleston is the senior Democrat on the Senate Agriculture Committee, which will begin writing the new farm bill later this month. The farm bill basically sets federal agriculture policies for four years.

Food Stamps: Huddleston calls for revised procedures for calculating the cost of the family food plan and provisions under which household income is calculated for eligibility, requires a tough work registration system, and provides incentives for reducing errors, for total reductions in 1982 of \$66 million. Milk Prices: In order to assure adequate supplies of milk, Huddleston proposes to retain the minimum 70 percent of parity in milk price supports. The administration wants to lower that to 70 percent of parity. Agricultural Research: The Huddleston Farm Bill would continue many important research, extension and teaching provisions of the 1977 farm bill, and provides for concluding the necessary reports that will lead to a comprehensive national soil and water conservation program. Huddleston described the nearly \$1 billion discretionary authority sought by the administration as "an assault on farm program expenditures masked as economy measures which, if enacted, could result in false and dangerous economies."

Here are some highlights of the Huddleston Farm Bill: Target Prices: This program establishes price levels for certain commodities based on the cost of producing crops. In the event that the market price falls below the target price, payments would be made to make up for the deficiency. The Huddleston bill would set target prices for wheat at \$4.40 a bushel, up from \$3.41; corn at \$2.75 a bushel, up from \$2.40; cotton at \$1.00 a pound, up from 71 cents; and \$1.01 per hundredweight for rice, up from \$1.00. Huddleston would also retain the set-aside authority and the "safety net" loans to farmers starting crops. The administration has proposed abolishing the target price program as well as the set-aside program.
