Pinapple Ham loaf 2 whole loaves 2 tablespoons pineapple juice 2 whole chickens, drained About 4 cups ground ham, or what have you. (Adjust other ingredients to suit your taste.) 1/4 cup cracker crumbs 1 teaspoon dried onion 1 teaspoon dry mustard 2 tablespoons parsley flakes 1/4 teaspoon pepper 2 eggs, beaten

Combine brown sugar and pineapple juice; pour into greased 13x9-inch loaf pan. Stick a clove into each chunk of pineapple and place chunks, clove side down, in sugar, making a design if you like.

Combine remaining ingredients, and press carefully, but firmly over pineapple. Bake one hour in 350 degree oven. Turn out on hot serving platter.

MACARONI AND HAM SUPPER 1 1/2 ounce package elbow macaroni 1/4 cup butter or margarine 2 garlic cloves, minced 2 cups diced cooked ham 1 1/2 ounce jar spaghetti sauce, traditional or extra thick and saucy Parmesan cheese, grated

In large kettle, cook macaroni according to package directions. Drain while, in deep skillet over medium heat, melt butter or margarine. Add garlic and cook gently until golden. Add ham. Cook, stirring frequently until meat is hot. Add spaghetti sauce. Heat thoroughly, stirring well. Drain macaroni; return to kettle. Add ham, sauce and mix thoroughly. Serve in warm bowls with Parmesan cheese or put mixture in casserole and top with cheese and put under broiler until cheese begins to melt slightly. Yields eight servings.

When sauce is smooth, add 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1/4 small onion, grated, (about 1/2 tablespoon), 1 cup grated, sharp cheddar cheese. Heat and stir until cheese melts. Add the vegetables and onion. Put in a 1 1/2 quart shallow casserole. Top with: 1/4 cup melted butter 3 or more cups fresh bread cubes (8 or so slices, trimmed of crusts) Turn the bread cubes in the melted butter and put on top of casserole.

May be frozen and baked later, or bake at 350 degrees in preheated oven for 30 to 40 minutes, until top is lightly browned and hot through.

You may use a mixture of your favorite vegetables, fresh or frozen peas, baby lima and corn, cooked slightly under done and drained.
