

Federal legislation proposed to continue Community Action

Proposed legislation (HR 964) which will aid in the certification of Community Action was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives recently by Representative Andrew of North Carolina. According to Dr. Cara E. Richards, chairperson of the board of directors of the Community Action Agency, "Congressman Andrew's legislation would provide for the reauthorization of the Economic Opportunity Act. This act authorizes the existence of Community Action agencies such as Community Action Lexington-Fayette as well as the Head Start program." Dr. Richards added that Representative Carl Perkins of the seventh district of Kentucky has expressed strong support of Representative Andrew's legislation and will be likely co-sponsor of the bill.

HR 964 provides for a three-year extension of the Community Services Administration (CSA), the sponsoring

federal agency for Community Action agencies." Dr. Richards stated. The subcommittee on human resources of the House Committee on Education and Labor begins hearings on HR 964 on April 28 in Washington. Public comment on the bill should be sent to Representative Andrew, Representative Perkins and all other members of Kentucky's Congressional delegation.

The agency currently serves the low-income and elderly of Lexington-Fayette, Nicholas, Bourbon and Harrison Counties. During its last program year Community Action provided services to over 13,000 individuals including 380 Head Start students. In addition to Head Start, programs operated by the agency include CETA, Daycare, Weatherization, Clothing and furniture banks, community food and nutrition and Outreach and referral.

Dr. Richards cautioned that passage of HR 964 is not the only congressional action necessary for the continued existence of Community Action.

"In addition to reauthorizing the Economic Opportunity Act, Congress must also include funds in the 1982

budget for CSA and Community Action agencies." Dr. Richards stated. The subcommittee on human resources of the House Committee on Education and Labor begins hearings on HR 964 on April 28 in Washington. Public comment on the bill should be sent to Representative Andrew, Representative Perkins and all other members of Kentucky's Congressional delegation.

Now many nurses carry their Bibles to work

"Back in the 60s, if a nurse had carried a copy of the New Testament in her pocket, she might have been considered a religious fanatic," according to Marlene Waller, assistant professor of nursing at Berea College. But that was before the recent emphasis on meeting the spiritual needs of patients. "Now, many nurses carry their Bibles to work — and they use them," she reports.

This year, Mrs. Waller taught Berea's first nursing course aimed solely at spiritual care. Eighteen nursing students were enrolled in the class which included weekly visits with patients at the skilled nursing facility at Berea Hospital and the local nursing home.

"Course work included identifying and keeping lists of Bible verses that would be inspirational in certain situations, such as when a patient was lonely, depressed, experiencing guilt feelings or fear of death."

In addition, the class heard guest speakers — a hospital chaplain and a local pastor — who stressed that nurses, who are in frequent contact

with patients, could be helpful to ministers in the recognition and referral of a patient's spiritual needs. But because chaplains and ministers are not always available, and because illness and pain may block the patient's ability to pray, nurses need to be prepared to help cope with the situations that often accompany illness and death. Meeting those special needs sometimes means reading to patients, whether it is a favorite scripture or poetry, and praying with them. At other times, all the sick person may want is someone who will listen and understand.

"A good nurse is able to identify and meet physical needs. At the same time, however, she or he must be aware of psychosocial and spiritual needs," Mrs. Waller said.

Understanding and meeting spiritual needs is an important part of Berea's nursing education philosophy. "That is holistic nursing," Mrs. Waller continued, "the whole is greater than the parts." We teach our students to recognize and care for all the needs — biological, psychological, social, cul-

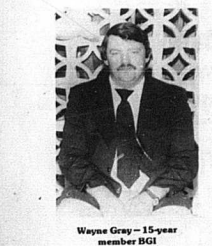

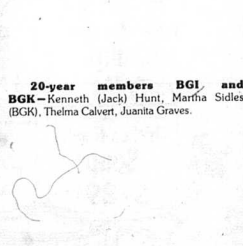

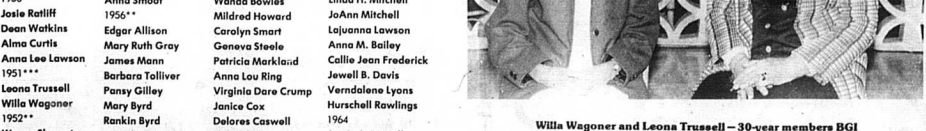
