Electric Coops to conduct use survey

Several randomly selected members of the Eastern Kentucky Power Board (EKPB) are being asked to participate in a survey form in the mail. The survey is designed to quickly check information concerning the member's residential use of electricity. The survey will ask questions concerning heating and cooling equipment in the home and the appliances that the members have or plan to purchase. The survey forms are return-addressed and pre-addressed for the convenience of the members to return after completing the form.

This survey of electrical use in the home will assist our cooperative in developing a better understanding of the member-consumer's electrical use habits and future electrical needs. Mr. Hutton Delaney, Planning-Mason REC's general manager explains, "We feel the information gained from this survey could have a significant impact on our future electric rates," continues Mr. Delaney.

Planning-Mason REC is one of the 18 rural electric cooperatives assisting East Kentucky Power Cooperative, which is conducting the survey program by determining the power needs of the 18 member systems. East Kentucky Power can plan additional generating facilities at a time when the

All Requests for Information to Intervenor's shall be submitted on or before October 30, 1981, with copies to parties of record. Intervenor's shall file Responses to all Requests for Information on or before November 6, 1981, with copies to parties of record.

The hearing scheduled on November 11, 1981, at 10:00 a.m. (EST) will be for the purpose of cross-examination of witnesses of Columbia, cross-examination of witnesses of Intervenor's, and the presentation of rebuttal testimony, if any, by Columbia.

Japanese students sample Kentucky hospitality

Dressed in blue jeans, tennis shoes and T-shirts, 60 youngsters with smiling faces listened attentively to their next day's schedule.

"Each of you will receive a color code denoting the stop where you will meet your host family," said Koiko Yamamoto, a tutor with the Labo program who accompanied them to the University of Kentucky. There was a pause while a woman translated the message into Japanese and then cheers and applause broke out in the room.

Most of the children coming to America are from the big cities in Japan. The exchange gives them a chance to experience rural life and to learn from a different culture, as well as the Labo theme, "How to Another Dawn," signifies.

The Japanese delegation to Kentucky is just a small part of a language training and exchange program, called Labo, through which 1,000 youth will visit the United States this summer. This is the fourth year that Kentucky 4-H has hosted Japanese students in the exchange, which was begun in 1972. Kentucky also sends teachers to Japan.

This year, six Kentucky 4-Hers left on July 19 to spend a month in Japan. Labo and 4-H have many of the same philosophies of youth development. "Learn by Doing" is the motto of the 4-H program and is the basis of the Labo program too," said Mrs. Hilda Hicks. The Labo exchange is the strongest international program of Kentucky 4-H, she said, and one of the most beneficial programs.

Through Labo, Japanese youngsters learn a new language and gain practical experience in the use of the language through a homestay in another country. The children study a second language through the "World of Us." The Labo program provides tapes of stories such as "Home and Away," "All Baba and the Forty Thieves," "Tom Sawyer" and "Peter Pan," which have been recorded in two languages, first in Japanese, then in English, Spanish or Korean. By listening to the tapes again and again, the children are able to learn the second language through repetition.

They act out the stories, do pantomime and discuss them several times. Some cultural habits and expectations are very different, but some are different enough to cause troubles if families are unaware of them. One of the major differences is bathing and families learn "that they are not as different as they thought. Said Mrs. Hicks, "Our host families do not bathe every five to 10 minutes, but they do bathe every day for that matter. The change can alarm some of the children if they drive."

PSC looks at gas regulation changes

The chairman of the state Public Service Commission said the commission plans to meet with representatives from natural gas companies and consumer groups later this summer as the first step in changing some of the commission's regulatory gas utilities. In remarks prepared for delivery to the Kentucky Gas Association's annual convention at Lake Barkley Resort Lodge, PSC Chairman Martin J. Volk said the procedural changes are necessary to reduce costs to the utilities and consumers.

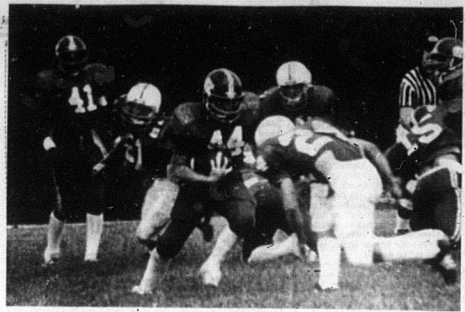
