Minor injuries sustained

Three county accidents last week

According to accident reports filed by Constable Ronald McDonald, there were three accidents in the county over the weekend.

The first occurred at 9:00 Friday evening when an automobile driven by Leroy Talbert, Mary's Avenue, Flemingsburg, went out of control on U.S. 60 and struck a car driven by Virginia Johnson, Station Road, Easton, Maine.

Talbert's car then went over an embankment. The report indicated that four persons in Johnson's auto received minor injuries, while her 1978 Volkswagen station wagon was completely destroyed. Talbert's car received considerable damage, but was not incapacitated.

The second accident took place at 1:10 Saturday morning when Joseph R. Smith, Route 1, Carlisle, lost control of

his car on Ky 38 and went off the road hitting a rock embankment on the right side of the road, skidded back across the road and hit another embankment on the left side of the road, and came to a stop headed the wrong way on the wrong side of the road.

The third accident happened only minutes later, when a car driven by Gary Stoddard, North Broadway, Carlisle, topped a hill and went into a

skid after seeing Smith's car sitting on the wrong side of the road. Stoddard's automobile crashed into Smith's knocking it into a guard rail.

Both cars received extensive damage, and Smith was taken to Nicholas County Hospital and released after treatment for minor facial lacerations.

School board will accept gas bids on weekly basis

In a special called meeting of the Nicholas County Board of Education Monday night, the board resolved its earlier problems in awarding a bid for supplying gasoline by unanimously voting to award the bid on a weekly basis throughout the year.

At last Monday's regularly scheduled meeting, the board had rejected all bids for gasoline. And Superintendent Elder told the Board at the called meeting that he had checked with Northfield Oil that there was nothing to prevent the Board from bidding gasoline weekly.

The primary reason for the move on the Board's part appeared to be the fact that no price guarantee was given in the bids. The price would fluctuate with the market. As board member William Damper said of the earlier proposed bids, "All they do is guarantee them our business."

Superintendent Elder said he had checked with both Northfield Oil, Cynthiana, and Ashland Oil—the two bidders at last week's meeting—and that both had told him that the price, even under bid, could fluctuate two or three times a week.

Under the policy adopted by the Board Monday night, the school system's gasoline will be purchased from the low bidder every week. All bids

must be in the Board office by 3:00 p.m. each Wednesday.

Board member Herbert Duncan raised the question of "what would happen if no one bid during any one week?" Elder responded that in the event that situation did arise, the company submitting the lowest bid the previous week would be contacted.

The board also agreed to allow an underground gasoline tank owned by Northfield Oil that is presently located on school property. The board agreed to pay a tank \$25 for the tank, primarily to save Northfield the trouble and expense of digging it up.

In other action the Board:

—Entered into a contract with Dymnans Motors for use of a driver education car at the cost of approximately \$150 per month.

—Moved to change the opening date of property insurance to the Oct. 12, 1981 Board meeting.

—Changed the date of the East Union School reunion to Aug. 22 instead of Aug. 29.

—Employed Linda Mason as Home Board teacher. Superintendent Elder said that a student is considered home bound if the student misses more than two weeks of school. By sending teacher to that student twice a week, the Board

can count him present for five days and thus generate additional ADA funds.

The teacher is paid hourly, according to the number of students being taught.

—Continued past policy by allowing 10 days of excused absences for students to work in tobacco harvesting.

—Authorized R. M. Lucas, Cynthiana, to clean and apply a filling treatment to the exterior masonry of the elementary school for a price of \$400.

Lucas said on his estimate to the school Board that following the silicone treatment, he would guarantee the brick, block and tile against water damage for 10 years.

—Voted to re-evaluate for bids on buses No. 22 and No. 27. Those bids are

to be opened at the September Board meeting.

—Heard from Superintendent Elder that Don Smith will drive bus No. 17 until the Board can find a full-time driver for that route.

—Decided to wait until next month's Board meeting to move on whether or not to increase agriculture instructor John Frisch's duties to include those of assistant basketball coach. The delay is to allow Frisch time to finish up his classes and other duties for this school year.

199th anniversary

Kentucky's pioneer history will be revived Aug. 22-23 at Blue Licks Battlefield State Park in Robinson County during the second annual Longhunter Days.

Tomahawk throwing, firemaking and hide tanning will be demonstrated by a history group, the Boone-Shelton Militia. Also scheduled is a cross-country foot race.

PSC and KU explain rate refund program

The Public Service Commission of Kentucky announced last week that an agreement had been reached between the PSC and Kentucky Utilities Company for resolving the outstanding issues remaining in PSC Case No. 9015 and the court litigation which ended June 19, 1981.

KU will mail refund checks by August 14 based on the amount collected greater than the final approved rates for retail customers during the period May 15, 1974, to August 18, 1981. The total amount to be refunded is \$1 million plus interest. A residential customer using an average of 750 kWh per month during the full refund period is expected to receive approximately \$15.

As a part of the agreement, KU and the PSC attorneys will prepare a stipulation to the Franklin Circuit Court for resolution of the questions of whether the Commission's Order of July 16, 1974 governs the total refund liability for the period of May 15, 1974, to August 18, 1981 or only a portion of that period, and if the refund amounts for customers KU cannot locate or account for must be based on the Commission's Order of July 16, 1974.

If the courts hold that two separate time periods are proper for calculating the total refund liability, KU will pay additional interest in the amount of the difference between 10 percent and 6 percent per annum for each of the period July 11, 1974 to August 18, 1981 as the courts may determine.

KU also will be submitting a plan to the PSC setting forth the terms and conditions of the refund. In addition KU will submit the estimated cost of making the refunds to the PSC.

Under the agreement, recent Commission orders concerning the refund are being withdrawn and a public

hearing which had been scheduled for August 14 has been cancelled, and the Company's recently filed annual challenge the orders is being withdrawn. Pending the agreement are the intervenors in the case, including the Attorney General's Consumer Intervention Division.

Pending further litigation or unforeseen circumstances, local taxpayers could see their 1981 property tax bills by the end of next month.

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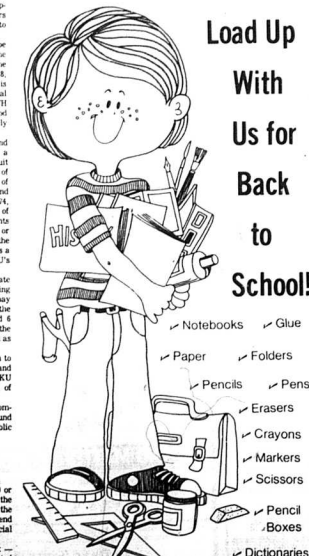
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
