

Santa will arrive by train Dec. 11

With no plan announced for a Christmas parade in Carlisle this year, Mayor Bill Power has come up with a plan of his own.

Power has made arrangements with TTI Railroad to have Santa Claus come to town on Friday night, Dec. 11, via a train car.

Tentative plans call for Santa to arrive at the TTI station around 7 p.m. He will greet all youngsters, pass out candy to them and talk with them.

There are plans for a short program which will be abridged by the crewing of a show Queen.

Several local merchants have told

Power that they will be staying open that evening, and the city fire department auxiliary will serve chili and soft drinks at the fire department.

Power said Monday night that this would be the first time, as far as he could recall, that Santa had arrived by train. Santa is scheduled to arrive on one of TTI's big coaches, accompanied by several helpers and candidates for show Queen from Nicholas County High School.

The program will be sponsored by Mayor Power, Carlisle merchants, TTI, the city fire department and the fire department auxiliary.

Newsprint hike planned

Newspaper publishers across the country may be faced with another increase in the cost of newsprint (the paper on which newspapers are printed), if an announced price hike by one of the industry's largest newsprint producers goes into effect as planned.

According to a report in the Nov. 23 issue of Publisher's Auxiliary Consolidated-Bathurst Inc. has announced that it would raise U.S. prices for its newsprint from March 1 to \$46 per metric ton. The current U.S. market price for newsprint is \$24 per metric ton, a level reached after a general round of increases last summer. That industry-wide price hike was also led by Consolidated-Bathurst.

If the newspaper industry meets the announced price, U.S. consumers will be paying 15 percent more for their newsprint.

James Still receives 1981 Milner Award

James Still, outstanding Kentucky author, has been named the recipient of the 1981 Milner Award.

The award, established to recognize the achievements of the late L. Hudson Milner of Louisville, former chairman of the Kentucky Arts Commission, is given annually by the Kentucky Arts Council in recognition of outstanding leadership in the arts in Kentucky. Still was chosen by the council from nominations submitted by people across the state.

Still, a native of Alabama, has lived in Knott County since 1932 where he has produced a remarkable collection of

poetry and fiction. His best known novel, *River of Earth*, published in 1940, was reissued by the University Press of Kentucky.

Still has written many stories, poems and children's books which draw upon his observation of life in Knott County.

He received the prestigious Marjorie Puckett Water Award in 1979 from the American Academy of Arts and Letters and the National Institute of Arts and Letters. The award is given in literature once every three years to an older writer for the continuing quality of his work.
