# County clerks support new auto title law

The Kentucky County Clerks Association has gone on record as supporting the DOT's plan for an automobile title law in the state.

Kentucky is currently the only state in the country which does not have an automobile title law.

If approved by the 1982 general assembly, the proposed law will separate the title of a motor vehicle from the registration process. Registration is permitted to operate a particular vehicle on state highways and is renewed annually.

A title is a document showing proof of ownership. A title would be required only when a vehicle is bought, sold or traded. Under the proposed title law, the county clerks will issue registration. Inspectors certified by the Department of Transportation will inspect the vehicle identification number and odometer reading.

This information is entered into a computer in the clerk's office and a title application forwarded to the Transportation Department's Division of Motor Vehicle Licensing in Frankfort.

Personnel in Frankfort will check for forged documents and compare the information with lists of stolen vehicles across the nation. If no problems are found, the title is mailed to the applicant.

The proposed title of the title would be \$6. The fee would be paid one for each car purchased. Revenue from the title fee will be split between the county clerks and the state.

# Watch your gas gauge during holiday travel

Many service stations along Kentucky's major highways will be closed on Christmas Day and New Year's Day, according to the Blue Grass Automobile Club-AAA December fuel gauge report.

Of the stations surveyed, 23 percent will be open on Christmas Day and 43 percent on New Year's Day. To avoid being stranded on highways, motorists should look for open service stations when the car's fuel gauge shows half full, AAA says.

The average price per gallon at full-service stations is now \$1.37 for regular, \$1.43 for no-add and \$1.47 for premium unleaded. The average price for diesel fuel is \$1.35. Self-service prices average \$1.27 for regular, \$1.33 for no-add, and \$1.43 for premium no-add.

There are good deals cooking everywhere in the state.

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# Famularo and Arnold attend meet

G.A. Famularo, chief district judge, and Jack Wayne Martin, judge-elect for the Eleventh Judicial District, attended a meeting of the Kentucky Judges' College in Louisville, Nov. 29 and 30.

The meetings are conducted annually for the purpose of keeping Kentucky judges abreast of current legal problems and solutions in conducting the business of the courts, and to further their knowledge of legal procedure and statutory regulations. Instruction and discussion are provided by national and state authorities in specific areas of the law. Such colleges offer Kentucky judges the opportunity to receive credit for continuing education, as encouraged by the state Supreme Court and approved by the Kentucky Bar Association, in order to maintain professional competence.

This year's District Judges' College offered a two-day examination of the substantive and procedural points which arise in suppression hearings, preliminary hearings, and trial situations. Mock trials devised by University of Kentucky Law Professor Vincent Fortson presented several hypothetical case scenarios which the 105 judges in attendance analyzed in follow-up workshops. Fayette District Judge William P. Thurman discussed the Criminal Rules of Procedure recently adopted by the Kentucky Supreme Court.

The importance of the courts in enforcing child support orders was addressed by Human Resources Secretary Grady Stumbo and Juvenile Court Judge Kenneth A. Turner of Memphis, Tenn. A report on the legal and logistical problems of HLA blood testing was given by Dr. James W. Geyer and Dr. G. Lynn Ryals, Jr., of the Biomedical Reference Laboratory Inc., Burlington, North Carolina. HLA (Human Leukocyte Antigens) blood testing can aid in the identification and paternity instead of merely excluding the supposed father in determining the exact percentage of a child being of wedlock." Such evidence would be proper in cases involving issues of child support.

Additional topics included matters involving the child abuse and neglect statute, as discussed by Senator Michael Meloney (D, Lexington) of the Kentucky Unified Juvenile Code and its effect upon the district court.

Judicial orientation was provided for the 17 district judge-elects attending the college. They will assume their offices on Jan. 18, 1982.

The College was conducted by the Administrative Office of the District Judges' College, Division of Education, with assistance from the District Judges' Association.
