Broken water line causes accident

A broken city water line was the cause of a two-vehicle accident in Carlisle Friday night.
Around 7:30 p.m. last Friday, a car driven by 19-year-old John R. Dodder, 108 Sycamore Hill, hit a patch of ice while traveling west on Main Street and slid into a Bronco driven by Janis Gray, Route 1, Carlisle, that was traveling east on Main.
The patch of ice was caused by a ruptured water line on Eastern Avenue that sent water gushing down the hill and out into Main Street where Friday night's chilly temperatures caused the liquid to freeze.
Neither Dodder nor Gray nor Gray's wife, who was a passenger in the Bronco, were injured in the accident. "We were lucky we were wearing our seat belts," the 31-year-old Gray said just moments after the accident.
Dodder's 1981 Oldsmobile received

damage to the left rear tail light and the left rear fender. Gray's Bronco received damage to the left front bumper and bumper.
A second city accident over the weekend occurred when a car driven by Harold Washington, 118 Circle Street, hit a parked car belonging to Martin Stone at the corner of Archdeacon and Main according to an accident report filed by city policeman Terry Truesdell.
According to Truesdell's report, Washington's 1977 Lincoln was traveling north on Archdeacon toward Main and struck Stone's parked 1973 Plymouth in the right fender.
The accident occurred at 3 a.m. Sunday morning.
No injuries and only minor damage to both vehicles were reported in relation to the incident.

Stolen truck found in county

A 1979 Chevrolet truck that was reported stolen by Robert Matten, Catherine Street, was recovered Monday night near Old Mexico in the Myers Station area of the county, according to Constable Ronald McDonald.
McDonald said that the vehicle had been set on fire, but that it was not destroyed.
"There was a gallon plastic jug that had contained gasoline" found on the scene, McDonald said. The jug, which had been placed in the seat of the truck's cab and set on fire. However, the arsonists shut the door on the truck before leaving the scene, and McDonald speculates that the fire smoldered out in the cab.
He said that the interior of the cab was destroyed, but that the remainder of the truck escaped serious fire damage.

School's out Christmas break begins

The Nicholas County School system will close for Christmas vacation next Tuesday, Dec. 22, and will remain closed until Jan. 4.
Superintendent Donald Elder said Monday that classes will be conducted for only half a day on Tuesday, and that no lunch or breakfast would be served at school. Elder said that children riding buses should be home "before noon."
Classes will resume on regular schedule Monday, Jan. 4, but breakfast and lunch will be served.

Wages drop in October

Statistics released by the Department for Human Resources last week show that the weekly earnings of Kentucky workers dropped slightly in October.
The average weekly earnings of production workers in Kentucky's manufacturing industries decreased to \$133.86, from September's \$133.95.

State general fund up 12 percent in third quarter

The majority of General Fund accounts continued to register moderate gains relative to the recessionary period of last year, according to a report released by George E. Farley, secretary of finance and Ron G. Geary, revenue commissioner.

July through October of 1981 tax receipts of \$68 million are 12 percent above the receipts from the comparable period in 1980. A large fraction of this increase is due to the coal severance tax the report said.
Receipts from the coal severance tax are running 36.3 percent ahead of 1980 levels. This is due to significant increases in both output and price, as the stockpiles depleted by the coal strike are rebuilt and the increased costs imposed by the strike settlement are passed to coal consumers.
Other sectors of the economy reflect a somewhat less optimistic environment. Sales and use tax receipts are 11.5 percent ahead of the depressed 1980 collection figure, while individual income tax receipts are up 5.2 percent and corporation income tax receipts are up 11 percent.
One bright note in the more than doubling of interest income on state investments, which has yielded \$5.3 million more than in 1980, the report said.
The Transportation Fund remains relatively flat as compared to 1980 receipts despite significant improvements from the major tax revenue sources.

DOT awards \$21 million in contracts

The state Department of Transportation has awarded more than \$21.4 million in contracts for construction projects in 17 counties throughout the state.
Included were projects to replace 36 bridges as part of the more than 200 bridge replacement projects included in the state's five-year road and bridge construction plan.
As part of the federal bridge replacement program, the federal government provides 80 percent of the construction cost and the state provides the remaining 20 percent.
A \$2.3 million contract in Mason

County was awarded to HAS Equipment Rental Co. of Flemingsburg for the reconstruction of KY 11 from near KY 1405, extending northward 1.2 miles.
In Floyd County, Kay and Kay Contractors Inc. of London received a \$1 million contract to build a bridge over Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River on Train Bridge Road.
A \$1.2 million contract was awarded to Hanes Construction Co. of Henderson to build a bridge over Lead Creek and a bridge over Yellow Creek on U.S. 60, Leeperport-Kawwawee Road, in Hancock County.
Kay and Kay received another contract for a \$1 million project to build a bridge over the L&N Railroad and Roundstone Creek on KY 406, Livingstone-Victory-Pittsburg Road, in Hancock County.
In Lawrence County, a \$910,141 contract was awarded to Bush and Burchette Inc. of Allen for construction of a bridge over Hockcastle Creek on KY 3, Inez-Losaux Road.

Bell wants rate hike

South Central Bell has asked the Kentucky Public Service Commission for an increase in rates to be effective Jan. 1, 1982. Phone company officials say the increase is needed to offset higher depreciation and station construction expenses.
The new rates seen that residential customers will see a hike in their monthly bill of between 41 and 43 cents for line service. Business customers will receive a monthly increase of \$1.96 to \$1.02. There will also be additional monthly charges for home users of 56 cents to one dollar for phones leased from Bell.
The first 15 minute increment for residential installation will also increase \$10.60, for single business

installation \$9.25.
Details of the cost increases were provided to the PSC last Friday by Bell officials.
The higher operating expenses are the result of depreciation re-estimation recently agreed on by the commission, Bell and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). A change in the method of covering the cost of installing telephone equipment also contributes to additional 1982 expenses for Bell. Both subjects - depreciation expenses and methods, and expenses rather than capitalizing station connections - were discussed in hearings before the Kentucky commission earlier this year.

Postmaster John Anderson said last week that the local post office will close its window service at 12:00 noon on Christmas Eve, and at noon on New Year's Eve.
Normal delivery of mail will be made on both days.
