

Youth Conservation Corps to hire young Kentuckians

About 200 Kentucky youths will have jobs this summer working to improve the environment while learning more about it.

Participating in the Youth Conservation Corps, the youth, Kentuckians will be hired to beautify public properties in 24 Kentucky communities.

Conservation Corps workers will be paid federal minimum wages for their work, said Fred Holler, director of the program. They will spend six hours daily in beautification and environmental conservation work on public lands owned by the federal government.

Recruitment for Youth Conservation Corps participants began Jan. 1 and will continue through Feb. 15. Applicants must be in good health, have a high school diploma or GED, be 17 to 24 years old, and have parental consent to work in either a local project or in a federal camp. Corps participants will be selected randomly from all eligible applicants.

Young Kentuckians interested in applying for summer work in the Youth Conservation Corps should contact their high school counselor or the Bureau for Manpower Services office in the county where they live.

Youth Conservation Corps state projects will be located in these Kentucky counties this summer: Boone, Bracken, Campbell, Christian/Hopkins, Daviess, Edmonson, Graves, Grayson, Hart, Lincoln, Livingston, Letcher, Magoffin, Martin, Mason, McCreary, Ohio, Pike, Robertson, Rowan and Warren.

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Bruised Bowie successful despite 'special' attention

The University of Kentucky's Olympic standout and All-America candidate Sam Bowie, will likely be in line for a rebound on the basketball floor, despite his injury.

On more than one occasion Bowie has been knocked to the floor while in the air for a rebound or a dunk. On countless other occasions he has been pushed and pulled while positioning himself for a shot or rebound. And putting up underneath the basket is sometimes one of the toughest things to do for him.

"Part of our offense is to push the ball down the floor and try to get it inside to Sam for a rebound or a shot," says Bowie. "It's a very physical game against me and everyone is starting to play like that."

"Sam has absorbed more than his share of contact," said Holler. "It's a credit to him that he is able to accomplish so much inside while being defended the way he is. He receives more punishment than any big man I've ever been associated with."

"We're young and inexperienced, but I believe we're improving every day," Bowie said. "We should be at our best when the SEC tournament rolls around, and maybe by then it'll be a little safer out there."

Meanwhile, Bowie will continue to court the bruises and be the most popular player on the floor.

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Judge explains direction taken by Sharpshurg Water District

The following article is reprinted from The Bath County News-Dispatch and is of interest to those Nicholas County residents served by the Sharpshurg Water District.

The Bath County Judge-Executive Jay Bailey this week gave some background on the Sharpshurg Water District situation and explains the course the board has taken to resolve the controversy that has arisen from the project's failure to provide adequate clean water at all times to its customers.

Judge Bailey's statement: I feel it is my responsibility to inform the people served by the Sharpshurg Water District. It is common knowledge that problems have existed with water quality and leakage for years.

During this period, we were trying to implement a project extending the Bath County Water District along Highway 36, via Highway 905 to Preston and adjacent areas, including Kendall Springs.

At this point in the proceedings the Rowan County District, supplier of water to the Bath County Water District, informed us that they were presently unable to furnish water supply to any new customers, cancelling the project for the present time.

A short time later, F.H.A. changed their funding priorities, moving end-damaged water supply to the No. 1 position, dropping water extension supply to No. 3.

Sharpshurg Water District has been considered a problem because of a high hazard dam located at Bethel.

Ron Clarke, planner with Gateway, and I met numerous times with the Sharpshurg Water Board explaining all possibilities for an answer to the existing problems plaguing the water supply.

The Sharpshurg Water District hired Messrs. Sudirth and Eberhardt, Engineering to do a feasibility study of possible solutions. Their recommendations are contained in a report line along Highway 36 to Bath County Water District, representing the Rotary Club of Central Kentucky, and purchase processed water.
