needed to heat a home during that particular time period, says Friday.
During January, all weather stations in Kentucky reported an accumulation of HDDs well above normal. The highest total was 1,229 at Covington, which was 196 HDDs above normal. Lowest accumulation occurred at Mayfield, with a total of 983 HDDs.

Over 80 Kentucky high school artists will display examples of their work at the 1981 Kentucky School Boards Association Convention at Executive Inn West in Louisville, on Feb. 22-24. This display is sponsored by the Kentucky School Boards Association in an effort to make school leaders and the public more aware of the diverse talents of Kentucky students.
"To our knowledge, this is the first time any statewide exhibit of this type has been held in Kentucky," said KSBAA President William L. Land, a school board member from Eminence, Kentucky. Each public high school in the state was invited to select one art work to enter in this event. Entries are from both large and small schools, urban and rural, and from all geographical areas of the state.
Purchase prizes will be offered by KSBAA for those paintings judged most outstanding. The works purchased by the Association will hang in the new KSBAA Headquarters in Frankfurt. "We want people who come to our office to see these visible reminders of the potential of Kentucky students," noted Land.
The paintings will be displayed in the Mary Room of the Executive Inn West from 1 p.m. Feb. 22 through 5 p.m. Feb. 24. All interested persons are invited to view the exhibit.
