Price support proposals up for untied burley

Producers of burley tobacco will be eligible for government grading and price supports on unlimited quantities of untied, baled tobacco — up to their marketing quotas — under a proposal that has been announced by Under Secretary of Agriculture Lester Lovick at Washington, D.C.

Limited amounts of baled burley have been eligible for government grading and price supports since the 1978-79 season, Lovick said. The proposal would mean all quantities of untied burley packed in bales would be eligible for price supports and for official grading by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, beginning with the 1981-82 season.

He said the proposed action will help reduce marketing costs to burley tobacco producers.

The proposed price support and grading changes are published in the June 24 Federal Register. The deadline for receiving comments is July 24.

Local woman stabbed in hand

Carlisle Patrolman B 1117 Mac Gannon reported that his mother, Mrs. Bertina Gannon, was stabbed in the hand last Monday night by an unidentified assailant.

The incident occurred at 10:46 p.m. at Mrs. Gannon's home on High Street after a man was spotted tampering with an automobile owned by neighbors Mr. and Mrs. Mike McCort.

The suspect reportedly ran from the car when he was spotted by Mrs. McCort and began running through the back yards of several residences in the Dorewylville area.

Patrolman Gannon said that Mrs. Gannon went around to her back door and when she tried to pull the door shut she was stabbed in the hand by the suspect who was trying to get in the door. The wound required nine stitches.

Local authorities have no significant leads in the case, although Chief Allen Earlywine said that his men have considerably stepped up regular patrols of the Dorewylville area.

A motion was passed to have the City buildings and equipment value taped. The tapes will be purchased for each building at \$25.00 each, and Bob Paul and/or Barbara Paul will do the taping at no charge to the City.

In other action, the City Councilman Paul did not vote on the motion.

Council gave City Clerk Mary Tapp permission to attend and pay the \$175 attendance fee for a Municipal Clerks' Seminar July 27 thru 31 in Lexington.

The seminar is being sponsored jointly by the Municipal League and the University of Kentucky.

The sick leave and pay ordinance was passed on the first reading, after a few minor changes were made in the wording. One day per month will be allowed for full-time employees for sick leave with pay. Advanced sick leave was also outlined in the ordinance. Part-time employees will not be included.

A letter was read from Taylor Mathers, co-owner of Mathers-Gannon Funeral Chapel, concerning the discontinued use of ambulance services in Nicholas County as of Dec. 31, 1981. A copy of a contract drawn up between Mathers-Gannon and Clark Funeral Home of Morefield stating such was enclosed. Mayor Power is going to look into the possibility of the County and the City working out a solution to the problem.

A letter was read from the Nicholas County Recreation Department requesting to look into City equipment service for use at the ball park to match federal funds for improving the park. The request was taken under consideration.

It was discussed at length, but no vote taken, on leaving the City office open on Saturday mornings for the convenience of people working out of town. It was suggested that the first two Saturdays after bills are sent out might be enough.

Frankie Hughes reported that a complaint had been made by Della White of water standing on the sidewalk in front of her home in Henryville after a big rain. When cars pass, water is splashed up on her porch, as well as on the sidewalk. Work had been done by the City but it only made the situation worse. Another possible solution is being worked out.
