The Jenny Wiley Summer Music Theatre opened its 17th season June 24 with new plays and a repertoire schedule enabling guests to attend four different shows each week.

The first show scheduled is "George M." which will be presented July 1, 2, 10, 14, 22, 29; August 4, 19 and 22.

Another exciting offer to playgoers this year is our May Lodge Buffet for \$2.50 one will enjoy before the play and with the receipt for the meal get a \$1 reduction on theatre tickets.
