High school to elect Advisory Council

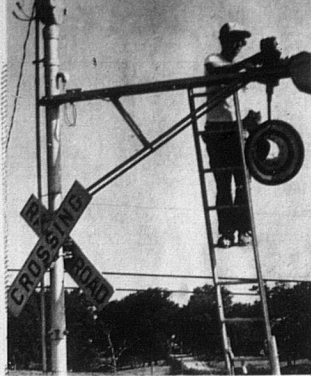

Food prices rise nearly a point

Food prices in Kentucky turned upward during June, according to Kentucky Farm Bureau's monthly marketbasket survey. Volunteer price checkers found supermarket index had increased 9.1 percent over the May level.

On the raw products, retail prices reflect, to some extent, changes in farm price levels, but such additional factors as transportation and processing may bear more directly on retail costs.

Six of seven dairy products experienced price jumps on the June tally with price gains on May. Others included eggs, bread, meat, frozen-canned vegetables and condiments.

The increase is the second under a 1980 state law which changed the gasoline tax from a flat nine cents a gallon to nine percent of the average statewide gasoline price.

Over the past 15 years, wages and salaries have gone up about as fast as the consumer price index. For example, a typical family in 1964 had an income of \$8,132, and it's grown today to \$18,815 — just about enough to make inflation. But because that family is in a higher tax bracket than it was in 1964, it pays more for Social Security. Its purchasing power is now actually \$1,000 less — in terms of the dollar's 1973 value.

Recent reported drops in gasoline prices are not reflected in the new quarterly rate because the law requires the July rate to be based on April prices.

We have examined the Statement of Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balances Arising From Cash Receipts, Cash Disbursements and Changes in Fund Balances for the year then ended, for examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly disclosed such items of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We also conducted tests of compliance with state and federal laws and regulations including federal revenue sharing requirements enumerated in the Audit Guide and Standards for Revenue Sharing and Disbursement Fiscal Assistance Fund Revenues issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from the cash transactions of Nicholas County at June 30, 1980, and in each receipt and cash disbursement during the year then ended, in conformity with the accounting system described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The supplemental information presented in this report is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but is presented as additional supplementary data. This information has been subjected to the same and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above, and in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

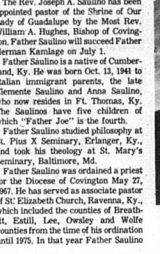
