Lexington bids for KHSAA tourney

On the eve of the Sweet Sixteen Tournament which begins March 14, Lexington Mayor Jim Amato let it be known that his city will pull all the stops to bring the bid to the city for the tournament's permanent home.

Speaking at a press conference this week, Amato stressed the commitment of his office and that of the entire Lexington community to bring the KHSAA here. "We are more than willing to meet the tournament's present and future needs," Amato said.

Amato recognized the efforts of First Security Bank and Trust, Foodtown Markets, McDonald's Restaurant Blue-grass Co-op and Burger Queen as typical examples of support from the Lexington community.

Amato cited many reasons why Lexington should be selected. He pledged the ongoing community support and promised that the KHSAA visitors would never get lost in the shuffle of just another event.

As a university town Lexington offers an atmosphere very distinct from larger and more complicated urban areas," the mayor said, adding, "With both UK and Transylvania located here, Lexington has an educational atmosphere so well suited to this tournament and the participating schools."

The KHSAA Board of Control will be deciding on the permanent home sometime after the tournament is over. Zeb Blankenship, president of the Board of Control, indicated that this decision will likely be made in late March or early April.

Tom Mills, executive director of KHSAA, pointed out that the most successful tournament held in recent years was the one held in Lexington in 1979. "The people of Lexington have shown by their efforts so far and by this press conference that they really want the tournament here permanently."

The Sweet Sixteen is the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Boys Basketball Tournament. It will run from March 18-21 at Rupp Arena and tickets are available at the Lexington Center Box Office, 412 West Vine Street, Lexington, Ky. 40501. Ticket prices are \$25. Tickets are also available at banks throughout the Commonwealth.

The Nicholas County Conservation District news

By William Halsecomb It is the time of year to renovate pasture and hay fields. In fact it has been time to renovate grass land for some time if the weather had been successful. Pastures and hayland can be successfully renovated until about mid April.

A field to be renovated should have the grass grazed or cut short so ground can be disturbed so the seed can get in contact with the soil. The present sod should be disturbed to a depth of six to eight inches. The sod should be covered with a legume or grass or both. In most cases the renovation will be to establish alfalfa, red clover, white clover, ladino clover or sorghum. Alfalfa and red clover should be seeded at a rate of four pounds per acre or more.

Ladino clover and white clover will need one to two pounds of seed per acre. Orchard grass might be seeded there if you need any of the weather had been so successful. Fields can have a soil test for fertilizer and lime needs.

All legumes should be inoculated with the right inoculate. Where a pasture or hay field needs to be renovated to get legumes re-established this will give more pasture and hay during the next months of the year. Most grasses stop growing short growth about June 1. The clovers start to grow well about that time. A pasture or hay field with a good mixture of legumes and grass will produce about 100 percent more forage per acre than just grass alone.

Some of the steeper, poor, and dry hillside will not produce much more than grass. Such land is a good place for legumes. Danzy Harwick is getting a pasture renovation plan to be custom work. This will be a big help in the pasture program for Nicholas County. One

Burley - Type 21 News Burley tobacco auctions ended for the season this week at Danville, Harrodsburg, Mt. Sterling and Shelbyville. Next week, final sales are scheduled for Louisville-New Albany on Monday and Lexington, the only remaining market, on Wednesday. Volume was light at the few markets selling the 12th week, reports the Federal State Market News Service. Buyers continued using a 1981 bid for most marketings. Only 1,718 pounds of Burley was placed under loan this week and just 21,388 pounds during the season. Bidders totaled \$10,185 pounds for the week and \$4.6 million pounds for the season.
