Kentucky Afield

Wouldn't it be nice if there were signs out on the lake directing you to good fishing spots?

Well, on several lakes around Kentucky there are such signs, and more are going up all the time. The signs, pictures of a fish approaching a hook, indicate where manmade fish attractors have been established. Currently, the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Service, has been the loudest in the nation, especially the fact that they're playing three of the four lures that baited for the 1980-81 Afield championship and the world champions make it a truly outstanding schedule.

Most attractors are made of brush piles anchored to the bottom. Brush is easily obtained and seems to attract fish better than "artificial" objects such as old tires or concrete blocks. With the crapple spawning season upon us, anglers should find these attractors particularly productive since they ought to form natural magnets for spawning crapple. However, studies have shown that almost all fish — everything from bass to catfish — use attractor sites during much of the year.

Most of the attractors established by the Fish and Wildlife Department cover about an acre to lake bottom and are marked at each corner by a buoy with the fish attractor symbol stenciled on it.

"A lot of fishermen think they have to park their boat right next to a buoy to be over productive," says Bill McLennan, the biologist in charge of the attractor program for Western Kentucky. Actually, McLennan says, there might not be any brush right beside the buoy, since these markers only serve to show the outer limits of the site.

"One way to determine if you're over an attractor is to notice how often your hook gets snagged on brush," McLennan says. "If you're not getting hung up, you're not fishing in the right place." The problems of getting hung up can be solved by using a light wire hook coupled with fairly heavy line — around 20-pound test. A heavy pull on the line will straighten the hook and free you from the snag. Then the hook can easily be bent back to shape by hand and you're ready to continue fishing. This is an old crapple fisherman's trick, one which works anytime you're fishing brushy areas with live bait.

So far, attractors have been established in Kentucky, Barkley, Heron, Rough River and Dewey lakes. Most of the work has been done on the Kentucky-Barkley area, where three agencies — the Fish and Wildlife Department, the TVA and the Corps of Engineers — have all built attractors.

Maps showing the location of attractors on Kentucky, Barkley and Dewey Lakes are available from the Department of Fish and Wildlife, Frankfort, Ky. 40601.

And when you're out fishing, keep your eyes open for these attractor buoys — they're signs saying "fish here."

High blood pressure can affect anyone. It is a physical condition in which the heart and blood vessels are strained by blood pumping with too much force through the body, and may claim one out of every seven Americans as victims.
The disease is generally easy to diagnose, and it would pay all Americans to have their blood pressure checked. Your family physician or other health care professional can do it for you.
