Tobacco's role gets spotlight

A new tobacco-industry report is bringing timely support for lead-growing states and counties where the crop has long been recognized as of top importance in the economy. In late April the study, made by Wharton Applied Research Center, University of Pennsylvania, was spotlighted at a meeting at Lexington, Ky., with over 200 tobacco industry leaders and government officials attending. The meeting was the latest in a series sponsored by the Tobacco Institute, to be held in tobacco states, this one showing the tobacco industry's direct and indirect contributions to Kentucky's economy. It showed that one out of every 14 jobs in the state is generated by tobacco, with salaries and wages totaling \$116 million. This is in addition to all the other returns from tobacco, the sale of the crop, and the purchases of goods and services supporting the "trickle" effects of tobacco on the economy. For the states served by the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association, based at Lexington, Ky., here are some of tobacco's contributions: Indiana — \$4,000 direct and indirect employment, paying \$60 million annually. Direct state taxes from tobacco \$181.7 million; direct federal taxes \$112.8 million.
