'Home Health Week'
 by Governor Brown

The week of May 16-19 has been designated "Home Health Week" statewide by Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. The Kentucky Home Health Association has been in existence in Nicholas County for about six years. A division of the WEDCO Health District, the Home Health staff extends services to home bound patients through a variety of health professionals. WEDCO District is comprised of Nicholas, Boone, Clark, Harrison and Scott counties.

Persons eligible for Home Health care are those referred by their family doctor who are homebound, but not necessarily bedfast. Diabetic treatment, physical therapy for stroke victims and blood pressure monitoring are some of the services the local office provides.

The goal of Home Health Care is to help the patient maintain a standard of well-being at home instead of the hospital.

Bonus payments to farmers to be issued for '75-'76 crops

 Nearly \$7 million in "bonus" payments will be distributed to farmers-members of the Barley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association early in June.
 The distribution represents net gains earned on 1975 and 1976 crop tobacco which has been held under loan.
 Checks will be issued to growers who pooled a portion of their crop in either of those two years. The 1975 crop returned \$2,362,820.73 clear of expenses, and the 1976 crop netted \$2,818,137.27, on barley assigned to the growers' Association under price support.
 These payments are in addition to advance money received by growers at the time of sale. Only those farmers with pool commitments out of their '75 and '76 crops will share in the current distribution.
 Approximately 150,000 checks are being prepared at the Barley Association headquarters, 630 South Broadway, Lexington, Ky., for the June mailing.
 As there were large barley crops marketed in '75 and '76, the checks will reach growers in every tobacco county in Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia and Missouri — the states in which price supports are handled by the Barley Association.
 When the disbursement process is completed the total returns to growers will be in excess of \$23 million over the 45-year operation of price supports.
 Last year the Association returned \$90,180.74 to growers on the 1974 crop, and in 1976 about \$11 million was distributed as earnings on the '69, '70 and '73 crops.
 Distribution payments on tobacco under loan are made after an entire year's holdings are sold by the Association.
 Net gains depend upon price received, costs of storage, insurance, processing, transportation and other factors, plus interest paid to Commodity Credit Corporation for advance payments to farmers at the time the tobacco is placed under loan.
 Alvin R. Beckley, executive secretary-treasurer of the Association, said the '75 and '76 crops earned a net of \$11,143,984.87 in interest for C.C.C. Also, the growers' earnings on those crops, included \$22,785.77 interest, which is included in the distribution.
 All of the loan checks of tobacco held by the Association have been sold, but \$4 million remains on hand under deferred sales contracts. Settlements on these await final commodity, after interest, storage and other costs, and final approval by Commodity Credit Corporation.
