Kay's Kitchen

For those of you just starting an herb garden, chives are one of the most easy to grow herbs to have. They are always in season. You can snip them from your garden for use in window-box. Potted chives can be found in most grocery stores and greenhouses. Look for bright green leaves that are tender and crisp. You'll want to keep chives in a sunny corner of your kitchen, watering frequently, and snipping them often to within two or three inches of the base. Indoors or out, keep the chives growing by cutting often. You may have to water for one day during the winter when they will not be growing quite as fast. Simply clean, chop, freeze and wrap in plastic bag or container.

CHIVE MAYONNAISE

1 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup chopped chives
1 tablespoon lemon juice
2 teaspoons tarragon vinegar
Dash of salt
1 small head lettuce
1 bunch watercress
4 hard-cooked eggs, finely chopped

Combine mayonnaise, chives, lemon juice, vinegar and salt. Break lettuce into salad bowl; sprinkle watercress and chopped egg over lettuce. Taste gently but thoroughly with enough chive mayonnaise to moisten.

Kentucky Business Scene

Before then, Kentucky must come to grips with restoring fiscal health to the state unemployment program. That can be done only by the state legislature, which isn't scheduled to meet until next year. Meanwhile, the state expects to borrow even more heavily from the federal government to continue paying jobless benefits through December. Rick Crawford, Kentucky's unemployment insurance director, expects total borrowing to reach \$100 million by the end of 1981.

A legislative committee is considering ways of dealing with the problem, in order to make recommendations to the 1982 General Assembly. While employer tax rates are bound to increase, consideration also is being given to cutting back the 26-week period that benefits are paid, reducing the amount of the weekly benefits and tightening eligibility for benefits.

Benefits currently are paid according to a formula based on a percentage of the state's average weekly wage and the amount a worker earns before losing a job. Some workers — notably agricultural and domestic employees — are not eligible for unemployment compensation, but Mr. Crawford estimates that about 60 percent of the rest of the state's workforce is eligible.

In all of 1980, those workers who were unemployed received \$74 million in jobless benefits. The same year, the tax collections from Kentucky employers amounted to only \$150 million.

Until last February, that imbalance was covered by funds collected by years when taxes paid in exceeded benefits paid out. But February was when that surplus was depleted, and when Kentucky joined 41 other states and territories in turning to the federal government for loans.

Kentucky's total unemployment rate has eased some since the first of the year, with the rate dropping below 10 percent in March for the first time in 1981. A continued drop will ease the burden on the unemployment compensation program and perhaps reduce the additional amounts expected to be borrowed from the federal government.
