Kentucky Afield

If you've been waiting for your favorite trout, you'll have to wait a while longer, according to Fife Pfeiffer, assistant director of fisheries for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

The May stocking has been canceled, Pfeiffer says, because of weather conditions last summer. The prolonged hot spell, coupled with low water levels in Lake Cumberland, caused a serious loss of trout at the Wolf Creek Hatchery, Kentucky's source of trout.

The intake pipe which draws water from the lake into the federal hatchery just below the dam is normally deep under the surface, where it can supply the under 60 degree water that trout need. But last summer, when this spring's trout supply was growing, the situation was different, according to Pfeiffer.

"Low water and hot weather caused the intake pipe to be in a layer of 75 degree water," Pfeiffer says. "As a result, the young trout started dying. The hatchery lost 70,000 trout in a two-day period alone."

Although replacement trout were eventually found, these fish were smaller than the ones that had been

lost. These small trout, around five to six inches long, were stocked in April only because the fisheries division didn't realize that they were going to be that small, according to Pfeiffer.

"Trout are stocked on a 'just-in-time' basis," he says. "So we would like the fish to be a desirable size — at least around nine inches long — before we stock them. We decided that it would be better to wait a month and stock larger fish than to go ahead with the stocking as scheduled."

The cancelled May stocking will be made up later, according to Pfeiffer, by a double stocking in the year. A total of 80 streams, nine tailwaters and eight lakes are on the monthly stocking schedule.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service did not cancel its scheduled stocking of streams in the Daniel Boone National Forest, so if you want some trout fishing during May, one of the 11 trout streams in the national forest would be your best bet.

In the meantime, the intake pipe for the Wolf Creek Hatchery has been temporarily lengthened and plans are under way for permanent installation to make sure the hatchery's water supply stays cold and the trout stay healthy.

Fishing report

Unpredictable weather continues to make for unpredictable fishing across Kentucky so fishermen must choose the time and place of their fishing trip carefully. The lake-by-lake rundown as reported by fish and wildlife conservation officers at each lake:

Kentucky: Catfish good at rocky points; bluegill fair; crappie slow off the banks to ten feet deep over cover; crappie fair, stable at summer pool, 60 degrees.

Buckhorn: Bass, crappie, bluegill slow; clear to murky to black, stable at summer pool, 60 degrees.

Groves: Crappie slow four to six feet deep over submerged cover; black bass slow on spinner baits along muddy banks; clear to stable at summer pool, 60 degrees.

Dewey: Crappie and bluegill slow around submerged cover and stick-up; clear to murky, stable at summer pool, 60 degrees.

Cave Run: Musky fair at heads of streams; bluegill slow; bass slow using spinner baits and flipping

along shallow banks; crappie slow six feet deep over submerged cover; clear, stable at summer pool, 64 degrees.

Buckhorn: Bass, crappie, bluegill slow; clear to murky to black, stable at summer pool, 60 degrees.

Groves: Crappie slow four to six feet deep over submerged cover; black bass slow on spinner baits along muddy banks; clear to stable at summer pool, 60 degrees.

Dewey: Crappie and bluegill slow around submerged cover and stick-up; clear to murky, stable at summer pool, 60 degrees.

Cave Run: Musky fair at heads of streams; bluegill slow; bass slow using spinner baits and flipping

EKU summer session begins June 15

Registration for the regular eight-week summer session at Eastern Kentucky University will be held beginning at 8 a.m. Monday, June 15, and classes will commence the following day.

Registration procedures and general summer school dates remain the same as in previous years with the observance of the July Fourth holiday, graduation exercises August 6, and the close of classes August 7. However, for the second consecutive year, the daily class meeting routine will be altered to aid commuting students in fuel conservation and reduced travel costs.

Classes on the four-day plan will meet for 75 minutes beginning every hour and a half with the first class meeting scheduled at 8 a.m.

The University's popular College Warm-up program for entering freshmen will begin June 22 and continue through July 3. Summer students who enroll in this program can earn seven college credit hours which may be applied to their academic record at EKU or transferred to most other universities.

Due to unique needs of special courses, some classes will meet on a five-day basis and these will be clearly identified in course listings.

Ag export up 18 percent

The value of Kentucky agricultural products exported during the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1980 totaled \$617.1 million for an increase of 18 percent over the same period a year earlier, according to state and federal reports.

"There is a big foreign demand for Kentucky products and these figures support our belief that those markets are expanding all the time," said Energy and Agriculture Secretary William B. Sturgill.

The export figures were compiled and reported by the Economics and Statistics Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Kentucky Crop Reporting Service.

Soybeans and soybean products accounted for the largest export dollar with \$264.3 million, up 20 percent from the previous fiscal year. Second only to North Carolina, Kentucky garnered \$181.1 million from the export of tobacco, most of which was haley.

Feed grains and related products ranked third among Kentucky agricultural exports, accounting for \$137.3 million in sales, up 20 percent from last year. The United States is the world's largest producer of white corn, and Kentucky produces approximately 25 percent of the nation's total yield.

"Kentucky wheat exports totaled \$3 million this year for an increase of 63 percent," Sturgill reported. "We're not going to put Kansas out of business, but \$3 million is an impressive figure."

"The farmers in Kentucky are becoming more and more aware of the export markets," Sturgill added, "and

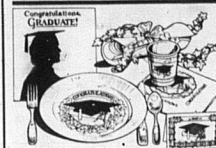
those of us in state government intend to do all that we can to help them make the most of those opportunities."

One example of those efforts is the trade agreement signed in February between Kentucky and Italy. Sturgill said the pact will bring together those

responsible for Italy's agricultural needs and those Kentucky producers who can supply them.

"Governor John Y. Brown Jr. has frequently stated his support for the state's agricultural community," Sturgill said.
