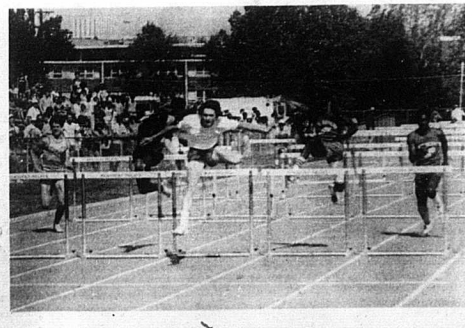

In the Second District, Elmo Myers won a narrow victory 151-149 over Andrew Bretz. Also in the Second District, Virgil Ritchie Sr. won another squeaker over Vernon Craig, 191-184, in the Constable's race.

In the Third District Magistrate's race, Earl Lee Flanck defeated Lovell (Bob) Livingston, while Johnny D. Caswell took the Constable's position by only 11 votes over Ralph McGlothlin.

Shopping guide due for Kentucky handicrafts

Potential buyers of handcrafted items made in Kentucky will soon have a shopping guide.

Artisans from all over the state are being asked to sign up for inclusion in the Kentucky Directory of Craftpeople which will be published in August.

More than 2,000 questionnaires have already been mailed to Kentucky craftsmen and craftswomen. The two-fold aim of the directory will be promoting the artisans and boosting sales.

The directory project was initiated by first lady Floyda George Brown. It is now a joint effort of the Kentucky Arts and Crafts Foundation and the state Tourism Department.

Mrs. Brown said the need for the directory is greater than ever since the recent "100 Kentucky" boutique opened at Bloomingdale's Department Store in New York focused renewed attention on Kentucky crafts.

The Bloomingdale's shop, filled with Kentucky quilts and other crafts, prompted numerous inquiries from individuals and store buyers across Kentucky and the nation concerning how handmade items from the Bluegrass State can be purchased.

"The directory will not only assist retail buyers but it will also act as a guide for tourists by listing both individual artists and the areas where their crafts can be purchased," said Mrs. Brown.

Journalism scholarships awarded in memory of former KPA manager

Scholarships awarded to Kentucky college students majoring in journalism will be given in honor of a founder of the School of Journalism Foundation, Victor R. Portman.

Portman is thought to be the largest contributor to the foundation. In 1960 he donated \$800 of his retirement money from the Kentucky Press Association to the benefit of the foundation.

Portman was chairman of a committee that formed the foundation in 1968 to support scholarships for students in journalism in the state's universities. Other committee members were George Joplin III of the Commonwealth - Journal, Somerset; Martin Dyche, retired publisher of the Sentinel Echo, London; and Thomas L. Adams, retired circulation director of the Lexington Herald-Leader Co.

Portman obtained his bachelor's degree in journalism at the University of Wisconsin in 1926.

He served as the secretary-manager of the Kentucky Press Association from 1942 to 1966. He taught in the UK journalism school from 1927 to 1962.

He is a native of Jackson, Miss.

Announcement of the scholarship foundation's decision to honor Portman was made by Carroll Kraloey, former president of the foundation.

New officers of the foundation are Paul Mick, Martin, president; Walt Dear, Henderson, vice president; and directors, Russ Metz, Owensboro; Don Towles, Louisville; Margaret Keith, London; Stan Portmann, Franklin; and Louis Owens, Lexington.

Scholarships of \$200 a semester are awarded to high school students who are recommended by their local newspaper publisher on the basis of need and to the student who is most likely to stay in college and finish work on a degree.

Summer registration at MCC is June 10

Registration for summer classes at Mayville Community College will be held on June 10. Registration will be 9-11:30 a.m., 1:30-4 p.m. and again in the evening from 6-8.

Classes for the eight week summer program will begin on June 11. Most of the 22 classes offered will meet twice weekly for 2 1/2 hours each session. In the past classes met more frequently each week with less classroom time for each session. This summer's schedule was devised so the participants could sign up for classes and make fewer trips to the college each week. This new schedule is intended to help reduce energy cost for students enrolled.

Many of the summer classes have been scheduled during evening hours to allow those who are employed full-time to register for classes after work hours. A very popular course of special interest is being repeated this year. "History of Kentucky" will be a travel course affording participants the opportunity to visit over 20 historic locations throughout the state during the six travel weekends.

Fees for the MCC's summer session remain unchanged from previous years. In-state credit hour cost for Kentucky residents continues to be \$17 per credit hour. Those registered as full-time students (\$4 credit hours) will be assessed a flat fee of \$102. Out-of-state full-time students will pay a fee of \$252 and out-of-state part-time students will pay \$42 per credit hour.
