

### Financial matters highlight court meeting

County finances were the highlight of discussion at last Wednesday morning's regular meeting of the Fiscal Court. During that meeting, the Court approved the borrowing of \$10,000 for the general expense fund.

The fund is once again dry, with the flow of tax revenues yet to pick up full-force. The county had already borrowed \$20,000 to meet general expenses prior to last week's meeting. The county has obtained the money at eight percent interest from one of the local banks.

The Court also discussed financial arrangements surrounding the burial of recently deceased Nicholas Conley III. Conley's estate is in an attempt to recover the costs of the funeral and burial. However, after some debate it was decided that the costs received from the sale of the 1980 International Ford and a 1986 Chevrolet pickup would not be worth the costs and trouble of initiating disposition of the car.

The Court also transferred \$22,000 from a fund budgeted for a general insurance fund to set up for insurance at the county farm. The bill for the farm insurance was \$22 more than was budgeted.

In addition, \$5,000 was transferred from one account to another in the road and bridge fund. The funds were shifted from the road repair fund to the maintenance and operating supplies account. That particular account is already overdrawn, and the entire road and bridge fund is running far lower than budgeted expectations at this time in the fiscal year.

In other action, the Court:

- Adopted this year's tax apportionment on second reading.
- Discussed a complaint received by County Attorney Conley about old trucks and cars parked at residences on the Upper Jacksonville Road. Conley told the Court that since the vehicles were not located near the roadway, there was nothing that could be done unless they were creating a traffic hazard.
- Discussed improvements at the local jail. Those improvements include the lining of the jail cells with steel plates to deter the recent outbreak of attempted escapes.

— Heard from Magistrate Harold Sheldahl regarding the case of the karate lessons at the local senior center.

— Discussed a request for a guard-rail in his district from Magistrate Andrew Davis. Judge Simon will take up this matter with the state highway department.

— Heard from Magistrate Melvin Fryman and Road Superintendent John Egan that Bill Highlander was interested in purchasing a piece of land owned at the county farm. Egan told the Court that he would be willing to sell the water-grate for \$500.

— Discussed the deteriorated condition of the county recreation park. Attorney Joseph H. Conley said that the situation is "a shame considering all the money and effort that went into (the park)." The Court will chain off the park to keep out the traffic after school hours is finished.

— Discussed the possibility of putting in a new sewer line at the residence of Frankie Beckner near Headquarters. The current work on the county-maintained state road is stopped and is causing a problem with run-off water.

— Discussed the progress of legal action brought by some residents of Mocksville. The county had just received the Court that he had just received the plaintiff's brief, and that he would now begin the county's legal work on the matter.

### Lawmaker's roundup

Wrapping up interim work — pre-filed legislative committee and the Interim Joint Committee on Banking and Insurance gave its listing to several proposed bills and agreed to present them for the 1982 General Assembly.

A host in the leading authority of the Kentucky Housing Corp. was among the measures approved. The bill will increase the corporation's bonding allowance by \$25 million and help families with a moderate income get housing.

Insurance companies cancelling a policy because of a health condition are not authorized to take the reason for cancellation but proposed legislation would take that one further and require the company to also explain how the policy holder can appeal the decision.

In addition, insurance companies would also be required to notify people leaving a group health plan. Benefits were offered that group plan. This may be available to them. Employers are now responsible for notifying the employees.

The Interim Joint Committee on Elections and Constitutional Amendments also moved out several pieces of legislation for consideration in 1982.

Review and Investigation Committee report, the panel endorsed Sen. Ed O'Connell's pre-filed bill to remove the ceiling on Kentucky's general obligation debt. The state's general obligation debt is constitutionally limited to \$500,000 — unless the voters approve a raise. The law is circumvented by issuing revenue bonds which carry a higher interest rate. A change in the way the state can go into debt could save the state money and raise Kentucky's bond rating from AA to AAA, O'Donnell said.

The committee also approved another constitutional amendment for pre-filing. This bill, proposed by the subcommittee on property tax alternatives, gives the legislature the authority to define what types of property may be exempt from property taxation.

First of black grant debates heard Representatives from the Department for Human Resources told members of the budget review subcommittee has not yet been created to disperse money from six black grants approved by the federal government.

The grants cover a consolidation of 29 health care and human services programs resulting from emergency medical services to community care.

Groups affected by possible cuts in their programs also testified before the legislative panel. Many groups complained because public hearings had

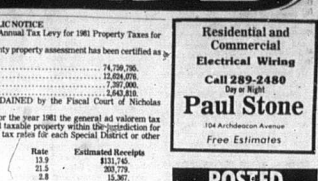
