Armand Hammer art collection now showing at UK Art Museum

Thousands of visitors are expected to see the Armand Hammer art collection, "Five Centuries of Masterpieces," at the University of Kentucky Art Museum, which went on display Tuesday and will run through Jan. 10.

This is probably one of the most important cultural events to take place in our state in a long time," said UK President Dick Singularity.

"We know that people will travel hundreds of miles to see this important collection, and we are proud to be the first university in the country showing it," Singularity said.

More than 100 works of art from the Renaissance to the 20th century are in the exhibition. Precious treasures by the world's greatest masters will be shown — works by Rembrandt, van Gogh, Rubens, Renoir and others.

"It does not matter whether or not you are a student of art," said Art Museum director Priscilla Cull. "This is an exhibition that everybody will see because of the great masterpieces in it, all collected here by the world by one man, Dr. Armand Hammer. It is a real once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for all of us," Cull said.

The exhibition contains paintings, drawings, pastels and watercolors by European and American artists. Early masters are represented with impor-

Biblical opera, 'Samson and Delilah,' comes to KET

The Bible as opera comes to television in the San Francisco Opera's production "Samson and Delilah" premieres Monday, Nov. 22 at 9 p.m. on KET.

The powerful retelling of the biblical tale, a presentation of the "Great Performances" series, stars Shirley Verrett and Placido Domingo in the title roles. The cast also features dramatic soprano Liana Scalet, Arnold Volkstein as the Governor of Gaza, and Kevin Lang as the Old Hebrew in the ancient story of strength, seduction, betrayal and redemption. The stage production is directed by Nicholas Joel and includes such social effects as participating in solar eclipse, a series of storms and exploding fires and the climactic destruction of the Temple of Dagon, in which Placido Domingo, as Samson, literally brings down the house.

An Act One of the opera, Samson is endowed with supernatural strength and called upon by God to lead the Hebrews against their persecutors, the Philistines. In Act Two, the seductive Delilah tempts Samson to learn the secrets of his strength and later entraps him. In the final act, Samson, now weak and helpless before his

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1 egg, beaten
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup finely chopped pecans
3 cups all-fort flour (approximately)
Cream butter and sugar, add beaten egg, salt, vanilla, nuts and flour, enough to make a dough easy to handle. Divide dough in half and roll in waxed paper until one inch around. As you roll the dough, push and pull lengthwise. Wrap each roll in wax paper, then in a piece of aluminum foil. Refrigerate until ready to use. Slice very thin, place on cookie sheet, not touching, and bake at 375 degrees. Watch closely, it doesn't take long and they won't be brown just around the edge.

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1 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup flaked coconut
1/2 cup maraschino cherries, chopped
Cream butter, mix in flour and sugar and press into greased 8-inch pan. Bake in 350 degree oven 25 minutes. Cool and cut into about 36 small squares.

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
