

### New blood donor year to commence Monday, October 12

A new donor year has begun and Nicholas Countyans will have their first opportunity to give blood on Monday, October 12. The blood donor program for Carlisle and Nicholas County provides valuable protection for residents of the county if the quota of 775 pints is reached. Since the county reached its goal last year, the Nicholas Countyans are guaranteed blood availability through September 1982. Three bloodmobile visits are scheduled during the year, plus two visits at these Great Industries. Persons between the ages of 18 (17 with signed parental consent) and 69 (up to the 66th birthday), weighing 100 pounds or more and having normal temperature and blood pressure are generally eligible to give. Persons taking medications such as vitamins, hormones and birth control pills are also eligible to donate.

Any person meeting the above qualifications may give provided it has been eight weeks since the last donation. Employees who donate at their workstations may also donate at the county-wide drawings, if the donations meet the time requirements. Since this is the beginning of a new donor year, donors who have not given since last October, or who have not encouraged to donate now, as this will provide continued blood coverage if

you move out of Nicholas County. Also, any persons who have received blood transfusions during the year, regardless of the source of the blood, should report such receipts to Rev. David Shalton, the county blood program coordinator, if they have not done so already.

The bloodmobile will be at the Carlisle United Methodist Church on Monday, October 12, with donations being received between the hours of 1 and 5 p.m., and again from 6:30 to 9 p.m. First time donors are especially needed, since the number of potential donors continues to dwindle due to age, health and other factors. Persons unable to give either at Blue Grass Industries or at the Methodist Church may still give at the Central Kentucky Blood Center, 330 Waller Avenue, in Lexington. The more to designate your donation as being for Nicholas County. Giving at other locations than those named here will not directly benefit Nicholas County.

Persons who would like to become a new recruit, or if you are not contacted about making an appointment to donate, you may call the county office at 280-2000 for further information. If you have questions concerning your eligibility to give, you may call the Central Kentucky Blood Center toll free at 1-800-427-6528.

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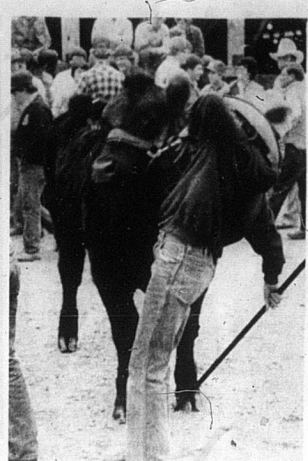

### Some Kentucky stores dropped from program

Because of violations, 72 Kentucky grocery stores were disqualified from the food stamp program during the first six months of 1981, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service reports. "Considering the fact that there are 6,318 grocery stores in the state authorized to accept food stamps, it is quite obvious that the vast majority of Kentucky retail food dealers are complying with the food stamp regulations," observed Edward W. Davidson, Southeast regional director of the food stamp program. Most of the disqualifications, Davidson said, resulted from stores selling ineligible items for food coupons, or discounting food stamps for cash. He added that food stamps, by law, can be used only to buy food. The only exceptions are garden seed and plants to be used to produce food. Davidson explained that grocers, when applying for authorization to accept food stamps, agree to abide by the rules and regulations of the food stamp program. When stores violate the food stamp regulations, they are subject to criminal prosecution and disqualification from the program for periods ranging from 30 days to three years. Currently, there are about 42,900 low-income people on the food stamp program in Kentucky. Each month they are issued nearly \$20 million in food coupons.
