### Battle of Perryville to be reenacted

A reenactment of the Battle of Perryville, a Civil War clash that occurred Oct. 8, 1862, and involved almost 40,000 soldiers of the Union and Confederacy, will highlight a weekend of memorial celebrations in Perryville, Ky., Oct. 10-11. Historians say that the bloody battle, in which there were more than 6,000 casualties, marked the beginning of the decline of Southern fortunes in the West, and thwarted Lt. Gen. Braxton Bragg's campaign to "tree" Kentucky from Union control. While neither side could claim victory in Kentucky's most important Civil War battle, Confederate forces suffered fewer killed and wounded, but chose to retreat rather than face fresh troops that were committed to the initial skirmishes. Activities that will begin Saturday, Oct. 10 at 9 a.m., at Perryville Battlefield State Shrine, include drill and demonstrations of authentic weaponry by participants in the reenactment, uniform and ladies' dress competition, a laying of wreaths to honor the Civil War heroes, and an address by Col. Frank Rankin, Commander of the Military Order of Stars and Bars, a historical study group. On Sunday, the day of celebrations will begin after the 9 a.m. opening church service at the battlefield. The reenactment of the battle, scheduled for 1 p.m., will be preceded by the commander's call, powder issue to troops, drill, and inspection of the brigade, led by Col. Louis C. Grivett, 10 a.m. Saturday, followed by an all-day reenactment of the battle. Perryville is in Boyle County, at the junction of highways US-60 and US-150.
