Migrant parent council elected

Bill Guthrie, Migrant Coordinator for Nicholas County Schools, announced this week the newly elected members of the Nicholas County Schools Migrant Parent Advisory Council. The members of this year's council are Deborah Calkins, Simon Joseph and Mr. Guthrie. This council is elected each year and aids the local school district in planning, implementing and evaluating the Migrant Program.

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Accident hospitalizes Ewing resident.

A single vehicle accident in the county Sunday evening left two Ewing men injured and one hospitalized, while the driver of the vehicle escaped without a scratch.

According to a report by Constable Ronald McDonald, the accident occurred when a car driven by Ricky July, Route 1, Ewing, struck the concrete bridge near Gray's Grocery on the Myers Station Road around 6 p.m. Sunday.

McDonald said that the car struck one side of the bridge's abutment and then crashed back and forth between the two sides several times before finally coming to a stop. The auto was totally in the accident.

Although McDonald reported that July walked away from the wreck uninjured, two passengers were hurt, Steve Fryman and Howard Hall, both of Route 1, Ewing, received injuries in the accident.

Fryman was taken to Nicholas County Hospital and soon released. Hall was dispatched from the local hospital to Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington, where he is under care for a head injury. Details of the injury were not available at press time.

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Kentucky Business Scene

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There are a lot of handicapped people out there with a tremendous amount of talent but they are screened out of the job market. And that's neither right nor fair," said Susan Birkhoff, communications and public relations specialist for Kentucky's Handicapped Employment Program.

But Mrs. Birkhoff isn't just to lambast the business community for not having the disabled to work in menial jobs. Instead, the program which operates under the umbrella of the Kentucky AFL-CIO acts as an advocate of better employment opportunities for the handicapped. And it offers financial incentives to the state's employers for taking part in the program.

As of July 31, HEP, using CETA funds, had reimbursed Kentucky employers a total of \$28,000 for on-the-job training costs in fiscal year 1981. Ordinarily, employers may receive one-half of a disabled worker's wages up to 26 weeks of OJT. Ms. Birkhoff said OJT reimbursement can amount to more than \$2,000 per worker.

The program serves the disabled and the business community from offices in Louisville, Elizabethtown, Lexington and Ashland. Those offices serve 90 counties. HEP's budget for fiscal year 1982 is \$58,000.

Starting this morning in April, 1979, HEP has placed about 400 Kentuckians with visual, hearing, orthopedic and other impairments into non-stigma as well as union jobs.

Dave Bremer, owner of Cowart and Bremer, said HEP bought the bare took used by a deaf worker hired to work at Mr. Bremer's auto repair shop in Lexington. Mr. Bremer also took advantage of the OJT reimbursement.

Newell Enterprises, a Somerset company that inspects automobile headlight lenses and reflects for defects, is almost completely staffed with HEP clients. One-half of the sales and marketing staff and five other handicapped employees are being reimbursed through the life of the company's OJT program.

And Specialties by Spalding, a Louisville advertising specialty firm, addressed a cash flow problem utilizing the program's OJT reimbursement to hire a 35-year-old bookkeeper afflicted with rheumatoid arthritis.

The union program works closely with state agencies in ensuring that its clients will be properly equipped to handle their new jobs. In some cases, it supplies the necessary tools and uniforms. Other times, it calls upon the state Bureau for Rehabilitation Services to pay for equipment required by the client, such as a specially streamlined wheelchair bought for a paraplegic working on an assembly line.

Ms. Birkhoff said the staff also assists handicapped persons with diagnostic evaluations, job counseling, vocational school training and apprentice programs. Some receive minimum wages from HEP while attending school.

Ms. Birkhoff said HEP intends to be an effective multiplier for client and employer. "When we make a good placement, and the employer is satisfied, we find it easy to go back to hire more of our job possibilities," she said.
