## Junior High drops loss to Paris

Nicholas County's junior high football team dropped a tough loss to Paris Monday night, 15-0, at the local field.

The Jackets, "who are playing awfully well," according to Coach Ben Pumphrey, came within two nightmarish plays of handing the Greyhounds a defeat. The Jackets had one touchdown called back on a penalty and saw another disappear when a Nicholas runningback fumbled the ball away in the end zone.

To date, the entire Paris football program — varsity, JV, junior high and 8th graders — has suffered only one loss this season.

Ricky Young was the leading offensive player in the contest for the Jackets. He gained 53 yards on seven carries. Following closely behind was Pat Pope with 46 yards on 12 carries. Scott Harvey picked up 28 yards on nine carries, and Brian Watkins had 15 yards on seven carries.

Young also led the defensive charge with 12 tackles. Right behind were Lewayne Baker with eight, Darren Robinson with six and Phillip Golden with five.

## User fee on burley was effective Oct. 1

A user fee of 94¢ cents a pound will be collected from burley tobacco producers as of Oct. 1, according to Commissioner Albert W. Barkley II.

The user fee pays for the grading and tobacco service at the warehouses. In the past, the federal government absorbed this cost.

"The government based the 94¢ cent a pound fee on last year's grading service cost," said Gerald Deatherage, who represented the Kentucky Department of Agriculture at the Washington, D.C. meeting. "A leak even assessment in the government's goal. Any over or under estimations will be adjusted the next year," he added.

Tobacco producers pay the user fee when they sell their tobacco. Graders collect the fees monthly during the tobacco warehouse season.
