Time ran out on the local junior high football team Monday night as they dropped a tough decision to Richmond-Madison 20-6.

The Jackets scored first in the contest on a forward run by Brian Watkins. Scott Haney added the two-point conversion on a run.

Madison then scored a touchdown, but failed on the extra-point attempt and a goal-line stand by the Bluejackets defense at the end of the second quarter gave the Nicholas County squad an 8-6 halftime lead.

Madison came out and scored in the third quarter, but the Jackets came right back on a run by Watkins and an extra-point attempt to take a 14-8 advantage.

Within three minutes remaining in the game, Madison hit a passing attempt that went the distance and jumped out 20-6. Time expired with the Jackets in the middle of a drive that could have resulted in a winning score.

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### Meat packing firm charged

Steve Brooks Meats, Inc. and the firm's owner, Vaston S. Brooks of Warsaw, Ky. have been charged by the U.S. Department of Agriculture with violating requirements of the Packers and Stockyards Act.

James L. Smith, a USDA official at Washington, D.C. said the firm and its owner buy livestock for slaughter in Kentucky.

Brooks and his firm have the right to a hearing. If the charges in the complaint are proved, Smith explained, they would be placed under a cease and desist order and could be assessed civil penalties.

"The Packers and Stockyards Act is a fair trade practices law administered by USDA.

## Discussed at MSU Political tradition of Appalachia

"The Political Tradition of Appalachia" will be the subject of a public lecture by Gordon McKinney in Morehead State University's Reed Auditorium today, Oct. 15, at 8 p.m.

Second of a six-part series, "The Mountain Heritage," sponsored by MSU's Appalachian Development Center, the lecture will focus upon the American myth of the isolated "ignorant, violent and poor southern mountaineer," a myth consistently perpetuated by federal poverty programs, radio, television, and even by the "romantic pages" of daily newspapers," according to McKinney.

The lecture series is funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The primary purpose of the series is to provide MSU students, faculty, and the general public with access to insight and understanding concerning the reality of the Appalachian heritage and experience.

Dr. McKinney is the author of a study of political developments in the Southern Appalachian mountains from the Civil War until the turn of the century. He holds a doctorate in history from Northwestern University and currently is associate professor of history at Western Carolina University.

Other scheduled lectures in the series include "Labor Conflict in Appalachian Kentucky," Nov. 12, John Heavener; "Land Ownership in Appalachian Ken-
