Services were held Saturday, Oct. 24 in the Lexington Cemetery for Lillian Collins Tucker, a longtime civic leader and the widow of Henry St. George Tucker Sr., former owner of Taylor Tire Inc. She died Thursday, Oct. 22, 1981 at the age of 80.

Mrs. Tucker was a great niece of Lewis Collins, author of Collins' History of Kentucky, which was among the first definitive histories of the state. Her interest in the enhancement and preservation of the state and Lexington were manifested in her longtime roles in Shakertown at Pleasant Hill and the Blue Grass Trust for Historic Preservation.

She served as a member of the board of the Blue Grass Trust and the House committee as well as being involved with the Christmas in the Park program. She also helped to secure support money for the restoration of the John Hunt Morgan Home and the trust.

A resident of 460 West Second Street, she was a graduate of the Hamilton School and the University of Kentucky, where she was a 36-year member of Kappa Kappa Gamma social society. She was a native of Georgetown and the daughter of the late Richard Darden and Eleanor Whitney Collins. During World War II, Mrs. Tucker was affiliated with the Irving Airmotive Co. She was a member of First Presbyterian Church and the Idle Hour Country Club.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Norman F. McGowan of Chapman, Ala., and Mrs. Stanley D. Pettey Jr. of Lexington; a sister, Mrs. Warren Huber Sr. of Ashland; seven grandchildren; a niece, Mrs. Tom Natus of Ashland; and a nephew, Warren H. Fisher of Carlisle.

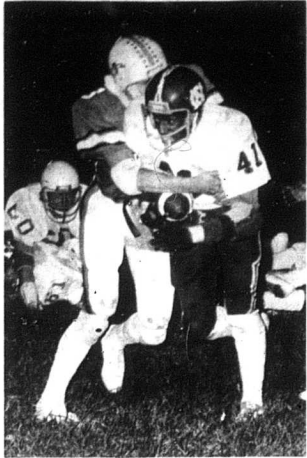

General fund receipts are up

Total General Fund receipts for the first quarter of fiscal 1981-82 were 18.5 percent greater than corresponding receipts for the first quarter of fiscal 1980-81, according to a report released by Finance Secretary George Adine and Revenue Commissioner Robert Alphin.

Although monthly receipts tend to be erratic, the general trend for the first quarter appears to be a marked slowdown in September receipts generated from the two major tax sources — general sales and use and income taxes, the report said. The one major tax source exhibiting strong growth for each month of the quarter was the coal severance tax.

General sales and use tax receipts (34 percent of the General Fund) exhibited a declining monthly trend for the July-September quarter.

USDA issues changes in Food Stamp Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has issued new rules requiring food stamp recipients in large metropolitan areas to show photographic identification when receiving their food stamps. Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block said the new photo ID system will play an important role in justifying the U.S. Departments of Agriculture and Justice in crack-down on abuse of the food stamp program.

Under the new rules, USDA will no longer replace food stamps reported lost or stolen. Block said these and other major anti-fraud measures are part of the Reagan administration's overall effort to eliminate fraud and abuse in the federal food stamp program.

State welfare agencies will be required to institute photo ID systems within a year in food stamp project areas with 100,000 or more recipients, unless they get an exemption from the program.
