Unemployment workshops set for September

The Kentucky Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring workshops on unemployment compensation to be held in Northern Kentucky September 22, in Lexington September 23, and in Bowling Green September 24. The all-day conference will begin at 9 a.m. and conclude by 4 p.m. It will discuss the need for Unemployment Compensation and will feature state officials from the Division of Unemployment Insurance who will discuss recommendations which will be made to the General Assembly regarding the unemployment compensation problems (officials from the professional consulting firm of James F. Frick, Frick Company of St. Louis will also participate). There will be an opportunity for employers to hear from and question top administrators about a program that has become an increasingly costly and frequently misunderstood business tax obligation. Unemployment Compensation is more of a concern because of the added cost of doing business as a result of this tax. In addition, there will be changes recommended for the Unemployment Compensation Law which will be presented to the upcoming session of the legislature as a result of the long continuing drain in the trust fund which has forced the state of Kentucky to borrow over \$50 million. Because of this and the prospect of continued borrowing by the state, Kentucky employers will be faced with a sizeable tax increase in their Unemployment Compensation Taxes in the near future. Using the above factors, Philip Thompson, President of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce stated: "It is in the interest of Kentucky employers that they learn how to better administer their Unemployment Compensation programs and so all they can to contain costs. These conferences are brought to the business community as a continuing service of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce. Programs such as these are indicative of our desire to help the individual businessman with his business concerns. We would urge all business people to take this opportunity to learn more about how they can control their costs in Unemployment
