## Hughes announces candidacy for Mayor

Councilman Frankie Hughes, 214 Elm Street, formally announced his intention to seek the office of Mayor of the City of Carlisle last week.

Born and raised in Nicholas County, Hughes graduated from Carlisle High School in 1961. He has been active in Carlisle's business community for the past 20 years.

In addition to his business activities and his position at the local post office, Hughes is a current member of the City Council, and has served as Mayor Pro-Tem for the past two years.

Hughes and his wife, the former Marilyn Neal Booth, have three sons: Miles, age 24; Mark, age 22; and Matthew, age 17. The family attends the Carlisle Christian Church.

Hughes is also a veteran and a member of the VFW and the American Legion.

Among Hughes' primary goals for the city lies a desire to have "all our services updated." He says the reason for this is to create an opportunity for growth in the local community.

With an updating of services, 95 percent of the city's needs can be met. Incumbent Councilman feels that when



an industry considers locating in Carlisle, "we can be competitive." Hughes said that "with the Mayor and the Council working together, Carlisle can grow and become a better place to live."

## Community colleges growing

The University of Kentucky Community College System of 13 two-year colleges across the state is estimating a record enrollment this year.  
Based on preliminary figures, total enrollment in the colleges is 26,772, a 7.9 percent increase over the official count of 24,742 last year.
